WRESTLERS IN A FAST GO TONITE

The stage is all set for tonight's contests at the Mills building, Klamath and Sixth, with Stanley Rogers of Medford and Don Nolan, Marshfield, appearing in the elimination bout for the light heavyweight wrestling championship of the Pacific coast.

Speculation is rife as to the showing Nolan will make against the husky Rogue River valley grappler who comes west from New Jersey with a long string of victories to his credit.

Nolan, rated as one of the coast's comers, has been piling up laurels throughout the Pacific northwest there past few months and hopes to continue his climb to mat fame by defeating the Medford Lithuanian here tonight.

Stanley has been yelling for a match for the past several weeks, in this city, and expects to establish himself as a strong contender for the coast light heavyweight belt to be awarded the winner of the elimination series here, in July. Those who have seen the big fellow go, believe he will show up well against the best talent in the state.

In addition, a crack semi-wind-up bout and two feature preliminaries have been arranged by Matchmaker McDufee for tonight's card, a lineup which he says rivals any shown to date.

Artie Nehf, who once performed his left handed pitching stunts for John McGraw, has personally accounted for the 12th link in the extensive chain of victories rolled up by the Chicago Cubs in their successful quest of the National League leadership.

Staging a remarkable comeback this season after several years of mediocre pitching, Nehf hurled the Cubs to a 3 to 1 victory over the Boston Braves at Chicago, yesterday.

Cincinnati moved back into second place in the league standing by defeating the Brooklyn Robins, 7 to 6, while the St. Louis Cardinals were suffering a crushing reverse, 10 to 6, at the hands of the New York Giants.

The hapless Phillies were beaten by the Pirates at Pittsburgh, 6 to 4. Remy Kremer held the invaders to two runs and four hits.

Rain washed out all of the American league encounters although the Cleveland Indians and Senators managed to play three innings at Washington before a downpour halted hostilities for the day.

The Indians were leading at that time, 1 to 0.

Miller Huggins, manager of the New York Yankees, announced that Urban Shocker, veteran right hander, had been restored to good standing on the club. Shocker was a holdout for some time after the season opened but finally came to terms.
