JIM McLARNIN NO MATCH FOR TITLE HOLDER

Sammy Mandell Retains Crown in Fifteen- Round Fight

NEW YORK, May 22. (AP)—The lightweight division still boasts the same old ruler—dapper, clean cut handsome Sammy Mandell—but if ever they award titles for raw courage in the prize ring, Irish Jimmy McLarnin must be crowned king of them all.

For fifteen rounds under glaring lights above a ring pitched in the center of the Polo Grounds, the black haired shik from Rockford, Ill., slashed and tore last night at the body and chin of the McLarnin kid.

Let's that shot out with the sting and drive of a whip lashed out about Jimmy's face. Short right chops closed his left eye, lefts smothered the other eye and punches from every direction brought a stream of blood from his nose.

Decision Is Popular
There was not a dissenting voice in the crowd of less than 35,000 that gathered in the big National league ball park when Joe Humphries announced that Mandell still was champion after fifteen rounds of furious battling.

For every one of those fifteen rounds, McLarnin, hoping always to land the smash that stowed away the ghost of the ghetto, piled into the champion—and into a storm of punches that battered his features almost beyond recognition. It was the attack of a youngster who didn't know what fear meant, a kid with a fighting heart that couldn't be slackened.

Jimmy's effort not only won him the plaudits of the crowd but the wholehearted recognition of the champion himself. But it gained him only three of the fifteen rounds and carried him on even terms with the title holder in three others. Mandell won nine rounds by wide margins.

Jimmy's Cause Hopeless
Jimmy's cause was hopeless in the face of the champ's power, when he hammered in to even the ninth and win the tenth. Only a knockout could win the title after Mandell slashed and tore the challenger through the next three rounds. But then it was that McLarnin fought hardest of all to gain the fourteenth round and end his title try.

To the critics it appeared that McLarnin, despite his sensational record and punching power, made his bid for the championship too soon. He could not cope with Mandell in ring generalship. He couldn't match his speed, and at times his boxing ability was almost pitiful in comparison with that of the blackhaired Italian. Jimmy plans to wait a year before trying again.

Sammy Was Weary
When the battle was over and radio beckoned the title holder who has defended his crown only twice in three years, his first words were for the loser.

"Gee, I'm tired," said Sammy. "I fought the greatest man I ever faced. I'm still the champion, but the next lightweight king will be Jimmy McLarnin."

RED SOX NICK YANKS IN 1ST AND LOSE 2ND

Boston Nine No Longer Doormats of Amer- ican League

The Boston Red Sox, long the butt of many a baseball jest, no longer are doormats to be trampled on with impunity by the rest of the American league. After a fine showing against the invading clubs in the recent inter-sectional series, the Red Sox came to New York yesterday, snapped an eight-game winning streak of the New York Yankees in the first encounter of a double header, 8-4 and then saw their own string of consecutive wins ended at seven in the night cap, 3-2.

At Philadelphia the Athletics moved up to within three and one-half games of the Yankees by taking both ends of a double header from the faltering Washington Senators 4-3 and 2-1. Old Jack Quinn won the first game with a single in the 13th inning. In the national league the Chicago Cubs came out on the short end of a home run battle with the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-7. Hack Wilson hit two home runs, each time with a man on base but Bottomley duplicated the feat for the Cardinals.

The Cincinnati Reds moved up to within half a game of the Cubs by splitting even in two games with the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4-3 and 6-3.

All other major league clubs had an open date.

WILD BILL TO MEET ROGERS THURSDAY EVE

WAR WAGED ON TULE HOPPERS

Rise Additional Funds to Fight Insect Pest in California

In the midst of his annual warfare on the grasshopper which the lower Tule lake region, C. A. Henderson, county agent, received word from Washington Monday night that \$4,000 additional funds have been appropriated for the battle this season. This makes a total of \$7000 to be used in the annual poisoning campaign.

Well underway now, the work of controlling the grasshopper menace will continue for several weeks, Henderson said last night, pointing out that while Klamath authorities are behind the control movement, the hoppers are confined to Siskiyou and Medoc counties in California.

"There is a mistaken idea current that the grasshoppers are Klamath's own peculiar problem. This is entirely false as the menace is confined to northern California entirely," he declared. "The hoppers are thick around lower Tule lake, but have not invaded Oregon. Because there is no agency in California organized to fight the pests, my department is carrying on the work."

SOLDIER FIELD TO BE COMPLETED BY OCT. 13

CHICAGO, May 22. (AP)—Soldier Field, Chicago's \$7,500,000 memorial to its heroes of the war, will be completed in its final architectural form by October 13, the date of the Notre Dame football game.

The field where Tunney and Dempsey waged their memorable battle last summer will have 72,000 permanent seats, with a capacity of 106,000 for football, track meets and other athletic exhibitions, where only a part of the field is used. Thirty-four thousand temporary seats will be thrown up across the north end of the field for football games.

The temporary seats and wooden structure at the north end of the stadium have been removed, giving way to a battery of steam shovels and pile drivers engaged in preliminary work on the permanent foundation and superstructure of the new stadium.

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Higher Heart Disease Rate Laid to Strain of Modern Life

LONDON, May 18. (AP)—The mental and emotional strain of modern life is mainly responsible for the 400 percent increase in deaths from heart disease in Great Britain and other countries, in the opinion of Dr. J. Strickland Goodall, London cardiologist and physician.

"While the death rate from cancer has increased rather less than 25 per cent, that from heart disease has increased nearly 400 per cent," Dr. Goodall informed members of the Institute of Hygiene.

"The form in which we take our pleasure," he asserted, "is a direct inversion of nature's demands for adequate rest."

The habits of visiting night clubs, drinking cocktails and smoking excessively were listed by Dr. Goodall among the destructive pleasures. He further maintained that "the emotional character of modern plays, novels and films, with their appeals to the baser passions, inevitably tends to overstrain with results which are reflected in the enormously increased number of deaths from heart disease."

These deaths are occurring at an earlier age than formerly, Dr. Goodall reported. Whereas a few years ago the common age of sudden death was between 50 and 60 years, an analysis of recent deaths had disclosed that "the age is becoming much less."

The physician recalled that 12 persons died suddenly in the United States while listening to the running account of the Tunney-Dempsey fight in Chicago, and that seven of these succumbed

when Tunney was floored in the seventh round. He attributed all to emotional strain.

A critical investigation of thousands of cases of sudden death has revealed, said Dr. Goodall, that most of them are due to arteriosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries, a disease often caused by hard physical work, mental strain and emotion.
