Pyle Runners Close to End Of Long Race

LIBERTY, N. Y., May 23. (A. P.)—A comparatively short jaunt of 37 miles to Middleton, N. Y., was the task of C. C. Pyle's transcontinental foot racers on their eighty-first lap today.

With only four more days of running Andy Payne, of Claremore, Okla., still held a lead of more than 15 hours over his nearest rival, John Salo of Pasine, N. Y. Salo finished second in yesterday's 59.1 mile lap from Deposit, N. Y., to Liberty, capturing another half hour from Payne's advantage. Salo's time was 10 hours, 57 minutes, 35 seconds, giving him an elapsed time of 544:03:11 for the 3,289.4 miles from Los Angeles.

Payne took fourth place yesterday in 11:31:45. His elapsed time was 544:23:36. First honors for the trek from Deposit to Liberty went to the Italian star, Guido Umek, who covered the distance in 9:57:45, nearly an hour ahead of Salo. Umek holds fifth place in the standing.

Frank Von Flus of Kerman, California, kept up the fast pace he has been setting for the last few days by finishing third in 10:57:49. This performance lifted him to ninth place in the standing, displacing John Cronick of Saskatoon.

CUBS' WINNING PACE CHECKED; BEATEN AGAIN

Yankees Continue Batting Spree by Trouncing Boston Red Sox

The reaction that almost inevitably follows extended winning streaks has struck the Chicago Cubs and forced them from the pace-setting position in the National League's wild pennant scramble.

After establishing a season's record for winning streaks when they ran up a string of 13 straight, the Cubs lost their third game in a row yesterday, St. Louis taking a 3-2 decision at the Mound city.

This defeat for the Cubs, coupled with Cincinnati's 5 to 4 victory over Pittsburgh, put the Reds back into first place.

The Giants took advantage of their opponents' five errors to beat the Brooklyn Robins 5 to 4. Vance weakened in the sixth. Brandt gave up but three hits as the Boston Braves resurged the invading Phillies, 3 to 1.

In the American League, the New York Yankees went on a batting spree reminiscent of their palmy days of last year. The champions pounded out 22 hits in scoring a 14 to 4 victory over the Boston Red Sox.

The Philadelphia Athletics traveled 11 innings before they could gain a 7 to 4 verdict over the Washington Senators.

Jack Ogden was wild and the Detroit Tigers beat the St. Louis Browns, 6 to 3. Most scored from second base on a wild pitch by Ukle in the eighth inning to give the Chicago White Sox a 4 to 3 victory over the Cleveland Indians. PUZZLING PLAYS Baseball By BILLY EVANS

Judged Where Last Seen. How does the umpire judge a ball that is batted over the fence or into a stand that is the regular distance for a home run 250 feet from the home base.

The legality of a home run that is batted over the fence or into a stand that is the regular distance from the plate is determined according to where it finally disappears from the umpire's view.

It is not sufficient that the ball be fair when it passes out of the confines of playing territory. It must remain a fair ball until it disappears from the view of the umpire-in-chief, working back of the plate.

Several years ago a change was made in the rule relative to a home run that passed out of playing territory. Under the

wording of the rule the umpire judged the ball according to where it was when it passed out of the park or into a stand. No attention was afterward paid to the course of the ball.

This rule caused more confusion than putting it up to the umpire to judge the ball fair or foul according to where he last saw it and a change back to the old wording of the rule was made.

Hooks and Slides

That old adage—"youth will be served"—is being buffeted around considerably this spring in major league baseball circles.

In this day of the lively ball and slam-bang tactics, a shut-out is the unusual among the 16 major league clubs. As a matter of fact, the New York Yankees were blanked only once during the entire season of 1927. That will give you some idea of what a difficult matter it is for a team to hold the opposition reeless for nine innings.

Despite the adage that youth will be served and that whitewashing the opposition is a most difficult matter, two veteran pitchers in their initial start of the 1928 campaign turned in shutouts.

Although veteran pitchers—any hurler over 20 years of age is so regarded—are supposed to need plenty of hot weather to be at their best, the two feature pitching performances of the first week of play had old time stars pulling the hero stuff.

Grover Cleveland Alexander, 41 years of age and in his 18th year of major league baseball, stepped right out and scored a shutout in his first start. Even more important, Alexander didn't pick any soft spot for his stellar performance. In whitewashing the opposition, he used the kaiserman brush on the pennant-winning Pirates of 1927, one of the hardest hitting clubs in baseball.

Then, just to keep Alexander from hogging the spotlight, Artie Nehf, 37 years of age, blanked Cincinnati in his opening game by the tight score of 2-0, being forced to bear down through the entire game.

The fact that Cincinnati once gave Nehf a trial after John McGraw of the New York Giants figured him through, only to have the Reds turn him loose, must have made the victory all the sweeter. Nothing pleases a ball player more than to beat the club that gave him the gate. This is particularly true of a pitcher, and, of course, a shut-out victory made the conquest all the more enthralling to Nehf.

The two unexpected shutouts scored by the 41-year-old Alex-

ander and the 37-year-old Nehf are a real tribute to pitching art. There are few hurlers in baseball who give more thought to their work than Alexander and Nehf. It is more than a mere throwing contest when they ascend the mound. Back of every ball pitched is a desire on the part of the two to outguess the batter.

The Alexander and Nehf of today are mere shadows of the two stars of 10 years back. There are a score of right and left handers in the two major leagues who have twice the stuff of either of the veterans, but few have their infinite cunning.

The remarkable performances of these two old timers in their first start of the 1928 season is the best possible proof that could be offered to show how much there is to pitching aside from the mere mechanical angle.

Use of the old "gray matter" has, temporarily at least, placed in the baseball background the theory that youth will be served.
