

WALTER HAGEN "WALKS OUT" OF IRISH TOURNEY

Noted American Golfer Called Poor Sport for Action

NEW CASTLE, Northern Ireland, May 29. (AP)—Walter Hagen, who was criticized by the British press two years ago for what was regarded as unsportsmanlike conduct, was the center of a similar storm in Ireland today.

He suddenly withdrew from the Irish Open golf championship, starting today. He explained that he was too tired because of his continental tour to compete. Some golfers seeing an outstanding contender eliminated, rejoiced but the golfing union of Ireland fumed.

Hagen, in telegraphing withdrawal, proposed to contribute his share of the proceeds of the match to any Irish charity the committee might name. The committee, however, decided not to accept Hagen's money because it considered his action unsportsmanlike.

"Hagen not only has injured his name as a sportsman here, but indirectly has hurt the good name of all Americans," Alan Kidd, secretary of the union, said. "Hagen seems to forget that he not only represents himself but his country as well when he comes abroad. When he makes an arrangement to appear in the Irish open championship and all arrangements are made, including the draw with a partner for him, then cancels his entry, we resent it."

TITLE HOLDER WINS IN FIRST

NEW ORLEANS, La., May 29. (UP)—Tony Canzoneri, of New Orleans, featherweight champion of the world, knocked out Claude Wilson in the first round of a scheduled 10-round fight here last night.

Making his first professional fight in his home town and his first bout since he won the title from Benny Cass in New York three months ago, Canzoneri swarmed all over Wilson from the opening bell.

PUZZLING PLAYS Baseball

TWO SEVERE PENALTIES

What is the proper ruling if a baserunner trying to score from third on the squeeze play is required at the plate because the catcher pushed the batter out of the way to complete the out?

This is one of the very few plays in baseball where two penalties are inflicted for one offense.

When the catcher interferes with the batsman by pushing him out of the way, tipping his bat or running in front of the plate to receive the ball, he commits an interference.

The act of the catcher, however, is construed not only as an interference, but a balk as well.

The interference on the part of the catcher entitles the batsman who was prevented from striking at the pitched ball to go to first. The balk has a direct bearing on the baserunner trying to score from third on the squeeze play. The calling of the balk entitles him to score and the run counts even though the man coming from third apparently was required at the plate.

Thus the catcher is twice penalized for his interference with the batsman, a balk and interference being called on the same play. This is quite unusual.

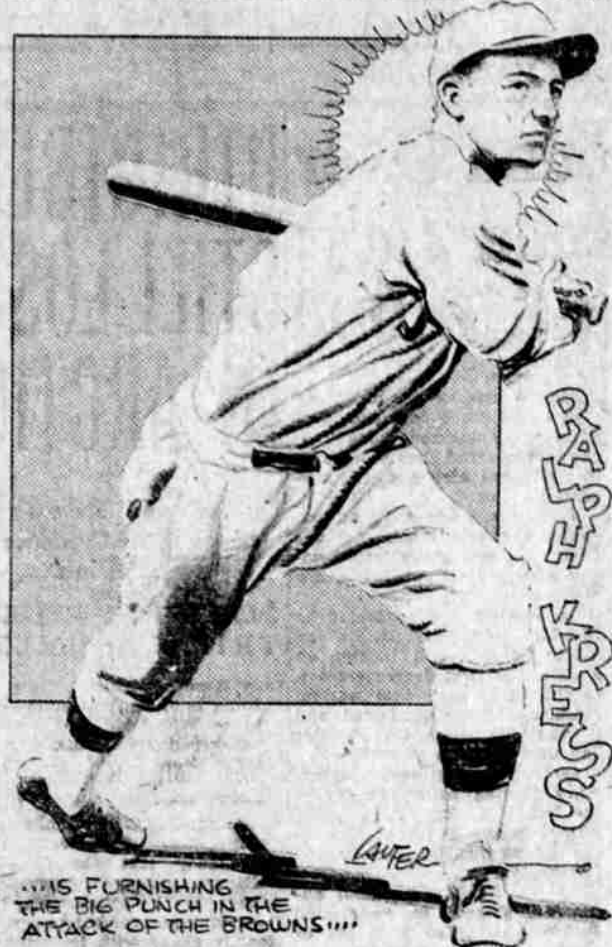

YANKEES AGAIN SLUG OUT LOP SIDED VICTORY

Philadelphia Athletics no Match for World's Champions

The American League's first and possibly last, crucial series of the season proved seriously only insofar as it concerned Connie Mack's Athletics.

Before the tremendous hitting power of the New York Yankees, the Philadelphia Athletics could make no headway and shared only one victory in the six game series that ended yesterday. Consequently the Yankees were leading the procession today eight full games in advance of the second place Athletics.

The last engagement saw the champions steam roller the Athletics into submission 11 to 4. For the second time in the series, the famed speed of Lefty Grove failed to stop Babe Ruth and company.

Boston Loses. Ed Morris, big right hander of the Boston Red Sox, saw a promising winning streak snapped when Tom Zachary and the Washington Senators beat him 2 to 0.

Walter Beck, former Western League pitcher, struck out nine men and allowed two hits as the St. Louis Browns nosed out Chicago 2 to 1. Seven of the strikeouts came in the first four innings.

Only one game was on the National League schedule but that saw the Cincinnati Reds strengthen their hold on first place by defeating their nearest opposition, the Chicago Cubs, 2 to 1. Pete Donohue, pitching his first game of the year, held the Cubs to five safeties.

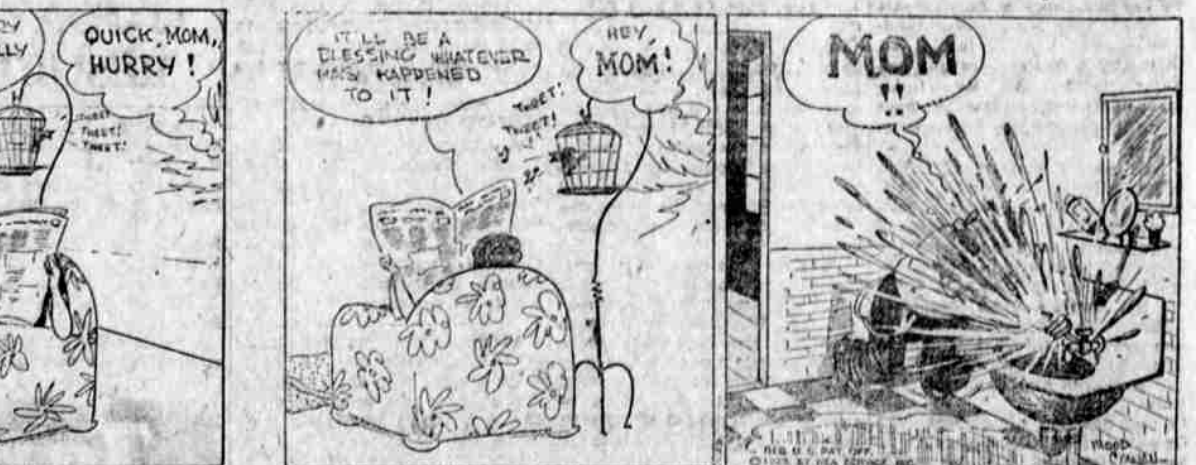
