## PORTLAND AND SAN FRANCISCO DIVIDE DOUBLE

Sacramento Drops Within One-Half Game of Second Place

The Seals got an even break on the day with Portland, winning the second contest, 3-2, chiefly because Smead Jolley whacked out a pair of homers and a single, and because Dutch Reuther was unhittable in the pinches. The morning tray was all Carroll Yerkes', the former Philadelphia southpaw turning the Seals back, 5-1, although Hollis Thurston cracked him for four singles. ## PHILADELPHIA GAINS ONE AND HALF ON YANKS

N. Y. Americans Nicked by Washington Senators, 5 to 0

Twelve major league teams were on edge today for get-away skirmishes to clear the decks for the season's second siege of inter-sectional warfare, scheduled to begin at some points along the baseball front as early as tomorrow. The Reds and the Cubs already were on their way east, while the Giants and the Robins lay idle, awaiting a brief resumption of their intra-city strife at the Polo Grounds tomorrow. At Six teams won twice yesterday. The Reds nicked the Cubs twice only by showing the greatest competitive spirit. There was a 6-0 victory over Charlie Root in the morning behind the fine pitching of the veteran Eppa Jephtha Rixey. Single Wins in 10th.

In the afternoon Ford's single in the 10th provided the winning margin in a 2-1 victory, sent the Reds east with a lead of three full games. The crippled Pirates sagged lower into the second division after the Cardinals scored victories, 10 to 1 and 4-3.

The Boston Braves walloped the Phillies 5-3 and 11-5. The Giants rolled the Robins over by 9 to 1 in the morning. The score was tied at 2 to 2 in the afternoon when it rained.

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## Inexperienced Los Angeles Youth Winner Race Classic

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31. (AP)—Jumping from obscurity to fame overnight, Louis Meyer, boyish looking Los Angeles youth today found himself acclaimed the newest hero of the automobile racing world.

This 23-year old driver thrilled a crowd of more than 140,000 spectators, breaking all previous attendance records by coming in first in the last 30 miles of the race to win the 500 mile classic at the Indianapolis motor speedway yesterday. He piloted his car to victory in the most dramatic finish ever enacted in the classic. He rode the entire distance without relief and made only one stop. His time was 5:01:33.75, an average of 99.482 miles an hour.

Meyer today gave credit for his driving skill to Frank Elliott, a famous racing star of other years. "Elliott taught me all I know about race driving," Meyer said. "You know I worked for him for two years as a mechanic."

"I thought I would win after 160 laps. I had worked pretty well into the race then, although I had only faint hopes of overtaking Jimmy Gleason and Tony Gulotta. I just sat tight and let the old wagon buzz along, and hoped for the best."

"Cap" Calkins and Gunner Peterson, financial emissaries of the club who have been lining up the necessary capital for continuation of the team—here, met with additional success in their final round Wednesday, with the result that monthly subscriptions will meet the immediate needs of the club.

The optimism expressed earlier in the week by those identified with the ball club, proved well founded last evening and when the meeting closed, Klamath's baseball ship appeared launched on a successful season's voyage.

Frank Hamm of the Merced, was named as business manager of the club, a selection which meets with widespread approval, both by fans and players, who feel that Hamm, with the cooperation assured him, can put the club on a smooth course and keep it there. Drew Bayless was retained as secretary of the organization, with Walt Fuller as team manager and Gunner Peterson as team captain. Board of directors was eliminated and full management of the club and team lies in the hands of the new appointees.

The league president was notified last night that Klamath Pelicans will remain in the game.
