Working on Roads—
A state highway department road cutting crew is at work on the McKenzie highway just west of Sisters this week, according to information from the local highway office. The cutting work will not cause motorists any great inconvenience, providing they drive slowly, it is pointed out. Larson Sells Shop—
The O. L. Larson shoe repair shop has been sold to M. S. Swinney, employee of the shop for more than two years, according to announcement made today. The shop is located at 609 Main street. Mr. Larson has purchased an interest in the Cherry Creek Haven, gateway to Sky Lakes and will develop and improve the property with Judge Short. The resort will open around June 15. The property includes around 140 acres and is fully equipped for campers. Horses and supplies can be secured at the Cherry Creek Haven for the trip into the Sky Lakes district.

Cafe Closed, Owner Held—
The New Yorker Cafe was closed Saturday as a result of a raid conducted by officers from the sheriff's office and members of the local police force in which Carl Hey, proprietor of the restaurant, was arrested for possession of liquor. Nine pints of whiskey were found concealed in a false table top, according to officers who conducted the raid. Although no abatement charge has yet been filed by the district attorney, the cafe was locked and Hey was held on a charge of possession pending his arraignment before Justice of the Peace Harry J. Angstead. This is Hey's second offense, according to officers, a former arrest resulting in a fine of \$250 being assessed against him.—Lake County Examiner.
