

WOOL MARKET NOT SO ACTIVE

BOSTON, June 1. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The wool market here has been possibly a bit quieter this week, but prices are firmly maintained and if there is a tendency it is against the buyer, notwithstanding the fact that the goods markets have given poor encouragement to the wool merchant, on account of the adverse weather.

"The west is being rapidly cleared of wool, with interest focused on Texas at the moment when best 12 months clips have been selling on the upper side of \$1.15, clan at Boston, and eight months wools at \$1.08-1.10.

"Foreign markets are all quiet but very firm. Mohair is slow of sale here but there is a good clearance reported at the cape and in Constantinople at the new clips."

FRANK LOWDEN TO "CARRY ON" WITH FARMERS

CHICAGO, June 1. (UP)—Frank O. Lowden, the "farmers' candidate" for the republican presidential nomination, echoed the recent protests of the middle-west farm organizations here today when he said: "If the republican party does not face the agricultural issue, the democrats will."

Lowden came to Chicago to complete convention plans with his campaign manager, Clarence F. Buck.

The results of their meeting brought out emphatically that Lowden hopes to "carry on" with the corn belt farmers in their protest at Kansas City against President Coolidge's veto of the McNary-Haugen bill.

RECLAMATION OFFICIALS TO VISIT OREGON

PENDLETON, June 1. (AP)—P. W. Dent, assistant commissioner of the bureau of reclamation, and George Kreutzer, director of reclamation economics will arrive in Pendleton tonight to conduct an economic survey of the Westland and Stanfield irrigation districts in the west end of Umatilla county. The survey is being made in an effort to properly utilize the water stored in the McKay irrigation reservoir, southwest of Pendleton.

WEST VIRGINIA FAVORITE SON STATE CHOICE

CHARLESTON, W. Va., June 1. (AP)—While returns from the 2,350 precincts of West Virginia were incomplete today, Senator Guy D. Goff, favorite son candidate for the republican presidential preference, seemingly had a sufficient lead over Herbert Hoover to offset any gains the commerce secretary might make. Approximately 2,000 precincts gave Goff a lead of 11,000.

On the democratic state, Governor Smith, New York, maintained a 4,000 lead over Senator James A. Reed of Missouri.

OPTION TAKEN ON G. P. ROAD

GRANTS PASS, June 1. (AP)—An option on the California and Oregon coast railroad, extending for 60 days, was granted by the city council to J. F. Reddy, in behalf of unnamed financial backers. Reddy asserted that his backers are ready to start construction of the road from its present terminus, 15 miles southwest of this city, to Crescent City, in northern California. Unless evidences of good faith are produced within the two months period, the option will be terminated. The California and Oregon coast railroad was constructed by the city of Grants Pass and the Twoby interests of Portland.
