Braves Nose Out Reds in Last Inning Rally Yesterday

The New York Giants owe a vote of thanks to their former team mate Rogers Hornsby, who is hitting the ball at a 418 clip for the Boston Braves.
The Rajah let go the Giants for the "good" of the club personally accounted for the run that pulled the Braves to a 5 to 3 verdict over the Cincinnati Reds at the Hub yesterday in one of the two major league games that rain did not prevent. The Reds defeat allowed the idle Giants to creep a bit closer to Hendricks' crew out in front in the National league race and determined to stay there with the score tied and George Sisler on base in the ninth Hornsby drove the ball into the center field bleachers, a terrific drive that decided the issue then and there. Six runs in the first three innings were enough to carry the Philadelphia Athletics to victory over the Chicago White Sox 6 to 3 at Chicago. Ty Cobb came out of a bad batting slump and drove in three runs with a single and a triple in the first and second innings.
All the other big time teams had an off day because of rain.

Ed "Strangler" Lewis Bars No Hold Adversary May Use

Have you ever noticed the methods employed by the different wrestling and fighting champions? What is looked upon as a virtue in one is characterized as a violation of ethics in another. Some wrestlers and fighters inject or make use of a certain hold or blow and immediately the customers boo. Another wrestler and fighter may commit the same offense only in a different form and the yowls cheer. Rather inclines us to the belief that Jack McAuliffe, the retired and undefeated lightweight champion, always had uppermost in his mind—"anything," said Jack, "is fair if you can get away with it." He meant that at times a referee will prove more lenient towards one fighter than another and permit a favorite principle to indulge in practices for which his opponent would be disqualified if he attempted the same stunts of practice. And as we reconnoiter and gather the threads of past performances and encounters we have witnessed in the ring and on the mat, we also incline to McAuliffe's estimate of what's fair and what's foul in the athletic pastimes.

PENDLETON, Ore., June 5. (AP)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, defeated John Firpo Wilcox, Indian heavyweight from Oklahoma, in two straight falls here last night. The champion took the first fall in 15 minutes with a headlock and the second in one minute with a series of headlocks, and arm scissors and top body pin.
Wallace Duguid, and Howard Cantonwine, heavies, went a half hour to a draw with Cantonwine the aggressor. Francis Stull of Pendleton took two out of three falls from Cecil Alford of Pendleton in another preliminary.

"Strangler" Lewis will meet Howard Cantonwine in Klamath Falls Friday night at the Mills arena in the main event of a wrestling card.
