A cheerful welcome from this city to all men who work in the woods, at the mills, in the sheep camp or on the ranch is one of the needful things to start this summer off properly.

At the present time there are more men at work in Klamath county than ever before in her history. Every mill is working, all the logging camps are active, the state highway department is doing heavy work in the county, the county court is expending large sums in road building, the city is paving miles of streets and the big sewer project is just getting under way, which, along with the Great Northern and Southern Pacific payrolls makes this year the banner year for this county viewed from the standpoint of payroll.

Klamath Falls is the center of all activity. She is the home town of every man and woman who is earning wages. As such she owes something to the laboring people in the way of a welcome that rings true. We want to make every worker feel that he is at home in Klamath Falls. Make it a workingman's town, which it is and always will be. The dinner pail is the official insignia of Klamath and let it so remain.

For, after all the man who works is the man who earns and spends. His money is the money that keeps every institution in this city solvent. The workingman's money pays for the town and without him no Oregon city would amount to much.

But to get the best results, to make harmony reign supreme we must as a community not overlook our obligation to the man who works. Slugging Behemoths in Great Shape for Chiloquin Card to Be Staged Tomorrow Evening

CHILOQUIN, June 5.—"Whose that tough looking hombre just getting off the train over there, Poll?"

"That guy, why say that's Bob Mariels. You know, the fellow that's goin' to fight Nails Gorman here Wednesday night."

"Say boy, he sure looks big and tough."

That is just one of some fifty such conversations heard here today noon when Bob Mariels, big Portland heavyweight piled off the train and was taken in tow by Matchmaker Savage.

Mariels is in wonderful shape and will do a light workout tonight. He has been training with Harry Dillon, Portland heavy and is looking fine. He says he will put Gorman away in less than five rounds. Nails somehow doesn't figure Mariels is man enough and says so. All of which should make a wonderful main event here Wednesday night when these two top notch batters get down to work. The winner of this fight will meet Harry Dillon of Portland here the night of Fourth of July for the light heavyweight championship of the Pacific northwest.

The semi-windup threaten to steal the entire show with two big heavies ready to exchange blows over the six round route. Klamath Falls is reported to be coming enmasse to see their favorite, Dick Reed, noted Oregon athlete, put Joe Swindler, Chiloquin's fighting police chief, out of business. Klamath money says Reed can beat the ex-probi, but Chiloquin money is still loyal to Swindler to hurdle this barrier in his big come-back which has already given him three victories in as many starts.

Joe is in the best shape of his entire career and is giving Gorman tough opposition in their workout sessions which are packing the arena every night with enthusiastic followers of the fist performers. Reed has been training hard for this battle which will introduce him to local fight fans and he is anxious to make a strong impression. He holds knockouts over Sailor McKinney, Red McLaughlin and Floyd James, three tough fighters and says he will add Joe to his list. Reed is one of the most popular athletes ever developed in Oregon. His ability is attested to by the fact that several leading heavies of the state have refused to meet him. This looks like a great bout.

The mysterious Dick Russell, of Fort Klamath but who really hails from San Francisco, made his first appearance at the local arena today and sprung a big surprise. He worked three fast rounds with Gorman and looked awful good. He has been working out in secret quarters until today. He meets Jack Davies local pugilist, in a four round special event. They are lightweights. This will be fast and furious with a certain knock-out for one of the boys. Can Jack stand the fast rushes of this stranger? Betting odds favor Dick slightly.

Three other fast preliminaries top off this unusual card. Spike Gorman, middleweight, will battle Big Tom Edmundson over the four round route. Joe Dabmore, Indian sensation, will tangle with Battling Cross in what promises to be a slugging affair with plenty of fast action for the most ravenous fan.

Opening the evening entertainment the fans will see none other than the Mexican Wild Man, Max Valencia, who is touted to win from Indian Butch Johnson. The Wild Man looks like a sure bet for the better things as he is coming along fast since his last fight here which was his first professional appearance. Additional seats have been installed by the management to insure everyone a seat. Two more exits have also been added which will relieve the congestion at the door. Tomorrow's the day. Chiloquin's the place.

DR. C. W. GREEN ELECTED HEAD IOWA COLLEGE

QUESTION BOND ISSUE LEGALITY

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 5. (A. P.)—The question of the power of a municipality to issue bonds for the purchase of aviation fields, was raised here today in the rejection of Roseburg's recent \$25,000 airport bond issue by the bank of Southwestern Oregon of Marshfield. The question affects every city of the state proposing to issue bonds for airport purposes. A Portland legal firm, examining the transcript of the Roseburg council proceedings, disputes the right of a city to issue such bonds, claiming that the city's authority is limited to purchase of land only for "public purpose" and there is no court decision or action declaring the purchase of an aviation field to be a public purpose.

Klamath Guard To Hold Dance

Arrangements have been completed for the "Mess Fund Dance" to be staged on Wednesday night by Battery "D," 249th Coast Artillery at the Altamont dance pavilion. Jack Bowring and his orchestra will provide the dance music.

The purpose of this dance is to create as large a fund as possible to provide luxuries and rations for the men while they are in camp from June 12 to 27.

Up until noon today, more than 200 tickets had been sold for the dance.

The battery is practically packed ready for its departure on Tuesday, June 12. The artillery will camp and receive instructions at Fort Stevens in firing the coast defense guns. The balance of the troops will be at Camp Clatsop.

Senator Corbett assumed the executive position as president of the senate. When he leaves for a trip to England June 10, John Carlin of Medford, speaker of the house of representatives, will become acting governor until Patterson returns.
