

Australia Seethes With High Excitement as Southern Cross Nears End of Pacific Flight

 SYDNEY, Australia, June 6. (UP)—The treat that every man prizes most highly—a meal cooked by his mother—will await Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith, pilot of the Southern Cross, and Charles T. P. Ulm, co-pilot, when they arrive here.
 Sydney, the end of the Southern Cross' 7,841 mile flight across the Pacific ocean, is the home city of the two men and their mothers were joyfully preparing for them today.
 The strain of listening for reports of the sons on the long and dangerous journey from the Hawaiian Islands to Suva had worn off and they were excitedly awaiting their "boys."
 The father of Captain Kingsford-Smith was also admittedly "on edge" with his son in the spotlight of attention of the entire world.
 "A mighty fine lad," he said. "I knew he would make it."
 A new American flag has been unfurled in Kingsford-Smith's home.

BIG PLANE TO RESUME FLIGHT

Smith, Charles Ulm, co-pilot Harry Lyon, navigator, and James Warner, radio operator, will hop off from Albert park here, where they landed after a 3138 mile flight from Hawaii at 10:45 a. m. (2:45 p. m. Wednesday, Pacific coast time) for the beach at Naeaeal.
 It was announced that the two Americans, Lyon and Warner, would accompany the Australians to Brisbane.
 At a brilliant ball at the Pacific hotel, in the aviator's honor, the governor presented them gifts from the colonists in the form of 200 sovereigns in a Fiji-made tortoise shell casket, and a tortoise shell badge inlaid with gold.
 Two young women presented floral tributes designed as the stars and stripes to Lyon and Warner, and a floral piece of the Australian flag of red isonia and south stars in eucharist lilies for Kingsford-Smith and Ulm.
 Co-pilot Charles Ulm made a speech and described a phase of the flight that was fraught with many perils.
 "I am telling you on behalf of myself and 'Smithy' that we would have been cold meat but for the aid of our two American friends, Harry Lyon, navigator, and James Warner, radio operator.
 "Imagine the roar of the plane's 600-horsepower motors, the plane's small cabin deafened with the roar of the motors, trying to send and receive radio messages 100 per cent efficient, 4000 to 5000 miles away. Jim Warner possessed no mean skill and was full of courage getting back to the old sea dog again. (Warner was a former steamship radio operator).
 "Night before last in the middle of the Pacific, the fates were not with us.
 "We struck bad weather. Our job was intricate. The direction was taken from the hands of the navigator. The wild flying was getting to the stage where one might just go mad. Smith was doing skilful flying, dodging storm clouds, turning right angles when flying 100 miles an hour.
 "The navigator's skill, resource, and initiative, were shown when, after all these quick movements throughout the night that he could plot out our position and when we came out of the mists, to say 'here, boys, here's where you are.'
 "That we came through was not luck. Get the right men and equipment, coordinate them and you will get through."
 Lyon then addressed the gathering.
 "I had to navigate," he said. "If I hadn't found Suva where would I have been? I have had such a good time in this world that I want to carry on."

Rose Festival to Have Dragon



Thousands of Blooms—Twelve Different Kinds—Were Used in Decorating This Monster.

Coming to Portland for the Floral Parade on Thursday of the Annual Rose Festival Week (June 11-16) are many entries from distant cities. Glendale and Pasadena, California, will send a replica of the Glendale prize winning entry (pictured above) in the Pasadena Tournament of Roses. The dragon is 85 feet long and 15 feet high. As it moves along the parade route it writhes its entire body, swishes its tail, rolls its eyes, turns its head, bends and closes its colossal jaws and blows fire from its nostrils.
 The decorative scheme called for the use of Hadley roses in the construction of mouth and tongue; white carnations for teeth and red roses for the eyes. The head was of yellow Clampus de Permet roses, violets and cornflowers. Body, tail and legs were of red carnations, yellow pom poms, calendulas and roses. 150 strings of amilax were used to define the scales of the monster.
 From a small civic enterprise the Portland Rose Festival has grown to international fame. A whole week is now required for its presentation. Coronation of Her Majesty the Queen of Rosaria takes place Monday. Opening of the Fiftieth Annual Rose Show, is scheduled for Tuesday. A Children's Pageant will be presented in picturesque Laurelhurst Park on Wednesday. The Junior Floral Parade is announced for Thursday and the Merrykhan Parade headed by The Parade of the Nations for Friday. In addition the mammoth Pageant "Where Ralls the Oregon" will be staged every evening, June 11-15, in the Multnomah Stadium where 30,000 seats are provided for spectators. These seats are also available for comfortable viewing of each Parade as it circles the massive bowl of the Stadium.
