GIANTS ATTACK FAILS TO MOVE REDS FROM TOP

Cincinnati Checks N. Y. Assault and Wins, 3 to 0, Yesterday

Eastern skeptics, waiting for the Cincinnati Reds to fall with a dull thud, are learning rapidly that it is more than luck that keeps Jack Hendricks' crew at the top of the National league standing.

Superlative pitching by Jackie May, rotund southpaw of Hendricks' mound staff gave the Reds a 3 to 0 victory over the New York Giants before 40,000 persons who packed the Polo grounds yesterday. The defeat cost the Giants second place.

Del Blonnette's 13th homer of the year was the only bright spot for Wilbert Robinson in the Dodgers crushing 15 to 7 defeat by the Cards.

Yanks Defeated
The American league program was featured by the ninth defeat of the season of the New York Yanks. The White Sox returned the trick at Chicago 8 to 6, despite Babe Ruth's 21st and 22nd homers of the season. Forty-three thousand saw the game.

Kress' single scored McNelly with the run that allowed S. Louis to defeat the Boston Red Sox 2 to 1 in 12 innings.

Sam Gray, Browns' ace, went the route and earned his 10th win in 14 starts.

The Athletics failed to diminish the 10 and one half games that separate them from the Yanks for they were soundly trounced 9 to 3, by the Detroit Tigers.

Jamieson's error in the ninth, coupled with singles by Goslin and Judge, enabled Washington to nose out Cleveland, 6-5 for the Senators fourth straight win.

Klamath Pugs Will Fight in Lakeview Ring

LAKEVIEW, Ore., June 11.—Arrangements have been completed for Melvin C. Anderson, West Side heavyweight, to meet Nalls Gorman, one of the coast's toughest glove tossers in an eight round go for the main event of the boxing card which will be staged at Round-up hall on Saturday, June 16.

Promoters of the bouts had planned to secure the services of Joe Swindler, Chiloquin heavyweight, against the West Side boy, but Anderson requested that he be given a chance at Gorman, according to the match makers. The local lad will weigh in at 200 pounds and Gorman usually fights at 195.

Although no opponent has been picked for him, Bearcat Burns, the Bidwell whirlwind, will be a feature of the card in a special 6 round event. The semi-finals will be a six round tangle between Ernest Dytert, Alturas, 170, and Jack Harmon, Klamath Falls, at the same weight. Both of these lightweights are said to be fast.

Mahr Meyers, one of the local favorites, will meet an outsider in Jack Davies, Chiloquin fighter, who will tip the scales in the same notch as the Lakeview boy. A curtain raiser will be given but arrangements have not been completed for one corner of the event.

I had the pleasure of playing golf with Babe Ruth for a solid week down south and the two things about him that impressed me was his unfailing boyish good nature and his supreme confidence in himself.

Babe uses a typical "base ball" grip on his golf club, and no matter how long a hole he is always asks his caddy the yardage.

On one par 5 hole a creek cut through the fairway near the green—a matter of 400 yards.

"How far is that water from here, boy?" inquired the Babe, as he took a few preliminary waggles on the tee.

"Give it all you've got answered the caddy. "You'll never reach the water."

"That's what they told me about several of the fences in the American league," said Ruth. "I never take anything for granted. Just because a thing never has been done before doesn't mean it can't be done. I've hit balls over fences they told me you couldn't hit one over if you shot it out of a cannon."

Which probably partly explains the secret of some of those home runs.

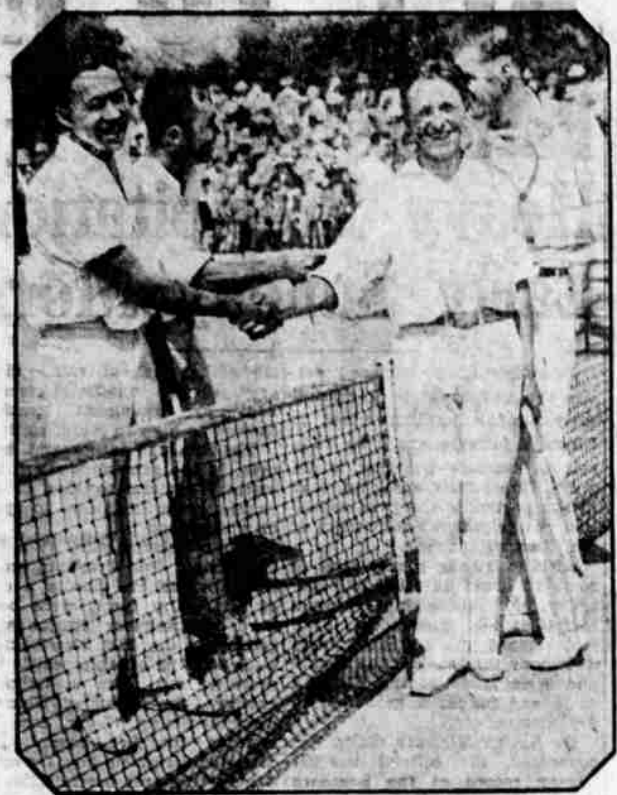

PUZZLING PLAYS Baseball

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Intent Not Considered.

On an interference play does the umpire at any time give consideration as to whether or not such interference was accidental?

Interference plays are the bane of an umpire's life. Such plays are often a matter of judgment unless the interference was so plain that there was no doubt about it.

While an umpire might often wish that he could temper common sense with the strict wording of the rule, it is impossible for him to give any consideration to whether or not the interference was accidental.

The fielder always has the right of way. It is up to the baserunner to avoid him. In some cases contact between fielder and baserunner may be more the fault of the fielder, but that fact cannot be taken into consideration. If there is interference, whether intentional or accidental, the runner must be called out.

If umpires gave thought to whether the interference was accidental or intentional, they constantly would be in hot water. The baserunner would have a perfect alibi in that he didn't try to interfere with the fielder, that the happening was purely accidental. Incidentally, when it was apparent to him that he might pull something and get away with it on the accidental theory, he would never overlook the opportunity.

While in certain cases it may seem that the penalty on the baserunner is rather severe, yet to give consideration to the possibility of the interference being accidental would make the life of the umpire a much tougher one.

How closely to the rule on an interference play is the advice I invariably give and follow.
