MELBOURNE, Australia, June 13. (P)—The trans-Pacific monoplane Southern Cross, carrying its crew of four and two passengers, flew from Sydney to Melbourne today in six hours, encircled the city and landed perfectly at Essendon airfield as 80,000 spectators roared a tumultuous welcome.
The crew, Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith, and Charles Ulm, Australian pilots, navigator Harry Lyon and Radio Operator James Warner, Americans, were greeted as they swept over the city by an escort of nine planes.
In the ship were Captain Kingsford-Smith's mother and Ulm's wife.
The eager crowd of spectators swarmed on the landing field and covered all the hill tops, buildings and every available space in the vicinity to greet the fliers.

Project No. 1.—Includes grading and surfacing Seven Mile-Fort Klamath Highway, a distance of approximately 7 miles. Fort Klamath-Wood River Highway a distance of 5 1/2 miles. Fort Klamath-West Highway, a distance of 5 miles, making a total distance of 17 1/2 miles, involving approximately 39,000 cu. yds. of surfacing material, 76,090 lin. ft. of machine and grader work, 8,436 cu. yds. embankment.

development of Pacific coast rivers and harbors as rapidly as shipping needs of the section demanded.

With a "favorite son" vice presidential candidate of their own to present to the republican national convention members of the Oregon delegation were today considering other possible candidates for the nomination.

Some consideration was being given Vice President Dawes for renomination by the Oregon delegation with some of the members declaring he would be acceptable if he meets with the approval of the Hoover leaders.

William F. Woodward, Oregon member of the convention committee on rules and order of business met only amused grins when he proposed as his contribution to the committee's report, a resolution providing that delegates and guests of the convention, park their chewing gum outside the convention hall and that usherettes patrol the aisles while the convention is in session, bearing tidling pitchers of ice water for the refreshment of the delegates. He denied, withal, that the latter proposal had any connection with the prohibition plank he has been advocating for the national platform.
