FLYING CLOUD LEADING RACE

Marathon Runner Entered By Grants Pass Caversmen in Front

SANTA ROSA, Calif., June 15. (AP)—Flying Cloud, Karook Indian entered by the Oregon caversmen in the 482 mile Indian marathon from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Oregon, had a slight lead over his 28 rivals in the race early today, the second day of the contest.

Flying Cloud was some distance north of here with the two Arizona Hopis, Arthur Pohufutewa and Dan Comahungnioma, closest on his trail. The Hopis camped two miles beyond here. Fourteen of the Indians had checked in here early today and the others were strung along the highway at various points between here and Sausalito.

The Zuni Indians expected by fans to divide the \$10,000 prizes with the Hopis got a poor start yesterday and observers practically conceded that the Hopis would reach Ukiah first. The Hopis expected to reach that point about 118 miles from San Francisco by noon today. Marathon fans believed the Arizonians would cut down Flying Cloud's lead and pass him this morning.

REDS HOLD ON PRECARIOUSLY TO FIRST PLACE

Cincinnati's Lead Cut to Three Per Cent; Cubs Climb Steadily

The Cincinnati Reds still were at the top of the heap today but their advantage over St. Louis had shrunk to half a game—three percentage points to be exact.

The Reds lost ground yesterday when they were washed out by rain at Philadelphia while the Cards were making it four in a row over the Boston Braves 3 to 2.

The New York Giants found the Pittsburgh Pirates no more to their liking, the Corsairs pulling out a 4 to 3 victory in 11 innings.

The Chicago Cubs drew up to within six percentage points of the third-place Giants by taking over Brooklyn, 7 to 3.

Yanks Beat Browns. The New York Yanks maintained their wide margin in what has been called the American league race, with a hard fought 4 to 2 triumph over the St. Louis Browns.

Three runs in the eighth inning enabled the Philadelphia Athletics to beat Cleveland 9 to 8. Washington won its seventh victory in its last eight starts by taking Detroit into camp, 8 to 3. Alex Metzler's double with two bases loaded in the fifth gave the Chicago White Sox a 5 to 4 verdict over the Boston Red Sox.

R. Hornsby is Suspended for Starting Row

NEW YORK, June 15. (AP)—Charged with responsibility for the bottle throwing that marked yesterday's game between the Braves and St. Louis Cards at Boston, Rogers Hornsby, manager of the Braves, today was ordered suspended for five days "for inexcusably bad conduct on the ball field." The suspension was announced by John A. Heydler, president of the national league.

WOOL TEXTILE INDUSTRY SLOW

Manufacturing Quiet But Better Weather to Improve Conditions

BOSTON, June 15. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"Business is slower in all branches of the wool textile industry.

"Prices have remained very firm, however, both here and abroad, for the most part, although Merino tops in Bradford are possibly a shade easier. The east India sales at Liverpool, however, have been steady and the new clip season in England is opening very strong.

"The manufacturing in this market is quiet but the advent of better weather conditions is expected to bring about improvement.

"In the west new clip operations have slowed appreciably and some wool is being taken here and there at slightly lower clean landed costs.

"Mohair is still quiet here. America is buying some hair at Constantinople at firm rates.

FINDS DIET HELPFUL IN SOME HEART CASES

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 15. (AP)—A diet rich in milk and carbohydrates, used in connection with the drug theophylline, has been found beneficial in certain cases of heart complaint, said a report to the section on general medicine of the American Medical association today. The author of the paper was Dr. Fred M. Smith of Iowa City.

The foods, Dr. Smith asserted, are chiefly milk, cereals, cream, butter, eggs, vegetable purées and fruit, served in small portions at frequent intervals. Dr. Smith attributed the diet's effectiveness to a low salt content, high energy value and the presence of energy-producing factors in easily available form.

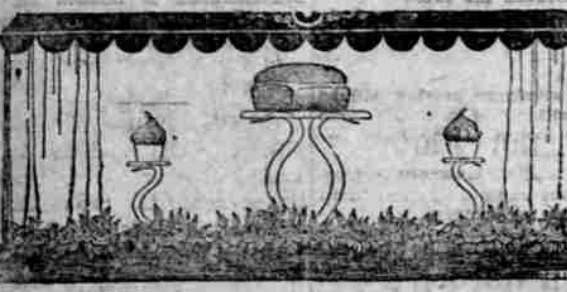
