Leader of Marathon Suffering From Weak Knee, Report

EUREKA, Calif., June 19. (A. P.)—Running with an ailing knee, Flying Cloud, Karok Indian, continued to pull away from the field in the \$10,000 prize marathon from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Oregon. He ambled into Trinidad, 28 miles north of Eureka, at 10:10 last night.

One hour later his nearest rival Melika, left Eureka where he arrived at 9:55 p. m.

In third place was Klamath, who put into the Eureka Inn at 10:15 and said he would rest a while.

The remainder of the field of runners were scattered along the highway south of Eureka, running on the hope that the leaders may not be able to keep the pace in the trying stretch before them.

ELK HERD MAY BE PLANTED IN SOUTH ARIZONA

BISBEE, Ariz., June 19. (U. P.)—A party of state forest and game officials today ventured into the Chiricahua mountains, 75 miles northeast of here, to determine the feasibility of planting a herd of elk on the southern Arizona range.

A complete survey of the grazing and water conditions will be made. If found satisfactory, a herd of young elk from the northern Yellowstone reservation will be transferred to the Arizona range.

CARDS STOPPED BY CINCINNATI

Reds Recover from Slump to Nose Out St. Louis

PUZZLING PLAYS Baseball

When Balk is Called.

Is it possible for the pitcher to make a balk without any runners on the bases, and does the calling of a balk have any effect on the status of the batsman?

It is impossible for a pitcher to make a balk without any runners on the bases.

The calling of a balk on the pitcher can in no way affect the status of the batsman, regardless of what the call of balls and strikes may be when the balk is committed.

It is possible to illegally deliver the ball to the batsman with no runners on and this condition is often confused with the balk.

For instance, if the pitcher, with nobody on the bases, delivers the ball to the batsman without having either foot in contact with the rubber, it is an illegally pitched ball. The umpire should rule it a ball unless the batter strikes at it.

This same act on the part of the pitcher with a runner on the bases would be interpreted as a balk.

Thus the same act is differently interpreted according to whether or not there are runners on.

When the umpire calls a balk on the pitcher, play is immediately suspended, which, of course, makes it utterly impossible for the balk to have any effect on the status of the batsman. The count on the batsman remains the same when a balk is called, regardless of whether the pitcher delivers the ball.

DRIGIBLE FLIGHT, PLAN NEW YORK, June 19. (UP)—Hans Ebner, German aeronaut engineer, who arrived today, said the German dirigible LZ-127, now under construction, would attempt a flight to the United States next fall. The ship will continue on around the world, before entering trans-Atlantic service, he said.

Young Corbett Defeats Zivic

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19. (UP)—Except for a few rounds in the middle of the bout, Young Corbett of Fresno had a decided advantage over Jack Zivic, Pittsburgh welterweight, and easily captured a 10-round decision here tonight.

There was no discussion from nearly 7000 fans when the referee raised Corbett's hand and the California boxer rose a notch nearer a title bout.

The Fresno southpaw had little difficulty in the first four rounds but Zivic landed some hard punches in the fifth and kept up the barrage in the sixth. The easterner could not keep up the pace and lost the closing rounds.
