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MISS EARHART WELL RECEIVED

toons, pulled out a cigarette and calmly lighted it.

Two ropes were fastened to the plane and it was towed three-quarters of a mile to the landing stage of the Imperial Airways. A boat with Mrs. Frederick Guest, sponsor of the flight, Raymond Guest, her son, A. K. Mills of Boston and the correspondent for the Associated Press, tied up alongside the plane and brought the party ashore.

Miss Earhart was taken off first and as Mrs. Guest embraced her, the sponsor of the flight said: "Well done my girl." All the way up Southampton water the American fliers were greeted with deep-throated sirens and whistles from the ocean grey hounds and other shipping. Everything that would make a noise was used to swell the welcome.

Miss Earhart, throughout the ordeal, remained a smiling demure figure as if all unconscious of what the great excitement was about. She talked freely with her friends of her great adventure, but appeared a little bit dazed by the commotion which she was causing.

Again the fliers were made to relate the story of their flight. "There were times when our hearts beat a little faster than usual," said the pilot, Wilmer Stultz. "Those were when the motors—never more than one at a time—began to misfire when the driving rain got into them. The rain lasted more than half the way."

"When the engines began to misfire we didn't know what to do. We knew there was no way of repairing them in the air. So we hoped for the best and breathed a sigh of relief when they picked up again and kept on with a steady roar. If just one of the motors had gone wrong we could have kept going but it would have injured our chance of getting completely across. If two of them had failed, well—"

Stultz is not adverse to flying back to America. "I wouldn't mind flying back. I'd like to use this same plane," he said. "It is now in perfect condition."

"I had no difficulty finding my way across despite the poor visibility. I knew exactly where I was all the time and when we struck Britain I did not believe I was more than a mile off my estimated course."

"I piloted the Friendship all the way across except for a couple of hours Sunday evening when Slim Gordon took charge. Miss Earhart bore the strain of the trip well. She never for a moment thought we wouldn't arrive safely and she constantly kept up our spirits with her smile and good sportsmanship."

Miss Earhart and her two flier companions left Southampton shortly after four o'clock this afternoon for London in automobiles.

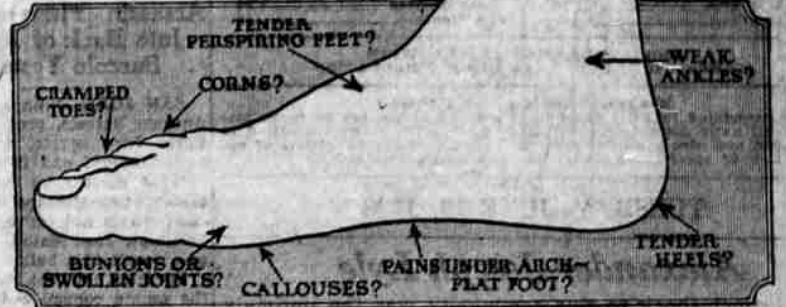
