PORTLAND SHUT OUT BY YOUNG GORDON RHODES

Hollywood Defeats Beavers 7 to 0; Oakland Loses to L. A.

Gordon Rhodes, youthful Hollywood hurler, was in great form against Portland, shutting out the Beavers, 7 to 0. The Stars nipped Tomlin for 14 safe blows. Batteries: Tomlin and Almsmith; Rhodes and Bassier.

Golden Bears Win Big Race

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 20. (AP)—California's Golden Bears swept down the Hudson river yesterday to win the classic four mile varsity championship race of the intercollegiate regatta, incidentally smashing the record for the course by 17 2-5 seconds in the astonishing time of 18 minutes 35 4-5 seconds.

Columbia was second, trailing California by three quarters of a length. Washington finished third, nearly two lengths behind Columbia, with Cornell, the Naval Academy, Syracuse and Pennsylvania following in that order.

Navy won both the freshmen two-mile and junior varsity three mile events, hanging up a new record in the latter of 14 minutes 18 seconds.

Cornell finished second in both these contests. In the freshmen race Syracuse was third with Washington, Pennsylvania, Columbia and California trailing.

In the junior varsity Syracuse was third with Washington, Columbia and Pennsylvania finishing in that order.

Bobby Jones Didn't Know How To Play Safe



WHY DIDN'T YOU PLAY SAFE? YOUR OPPONENT WAS IN THE TRAP ALSO?

If you follow Bobby Jones around in the U. S. open at Olympia Fields, Chicago, this week you will see that playing against par is no myth for Jones. Everyone, of course, plays with the intent of getting the ball in the hole in the fewest number of strokes. Several years ago in the British amateur at Muirfield, however, Jones furnished one concrete example of playing against the par of a hole without regard for his opponent.

On this occasion he had driven into a bunker and his opponent had found the same hazard with his second shot, and moreover, lay so close to the face, that he had a most difficult shot confronting him. Under the circumstances, it seemed to be Jones' duty to play out of the bunker, reach the green with his third and take a sure win, unless his opponent did something astonishing.

Instead, Bobby took a straight faced iron, with the object of reaching the green with his second, so to be sure of his par, and the result was that he smothered the shot and did not even get out of the bunker. A British correspondent, afterward seeking an explanation, was disconcerted to have Bobby impart the information that the par of the hole was four, and he merely was following the only method of playing the game that he knows, that is, getting the par.

FLYING CLOUD ON FINAL LAP OF LONG RACE

Karok Indian Leading San Francisco-Grants Pass Marathon

CRESCENT CITY, Calif., June 20. (AP)—Eighty seven miles from here to Grants Pass, Oregon, is all that remained today for Flying Cloud, leader in the 182 mile Indian marathon from San Francisco to Grants Pass.

He started from here at 6:15 a. m. today. Chief Ukiah was reported 24 miles south of here with Melika a mile behind him. Four tenths mile separated Melika and Klamath while Seymour Smith was 42 miles south. He was closely followed by Red Robin who in turn was a short distance ahead of Chief Geyser.

Mad Bull was resting at Orick at 6:45 a. m. Orick is 132 miles south of Grants Pass.

L. A.-Honolulu Yacht Race is Nearing Close

HONOLULU, T. H., June 20. (UP)—Three yachts had completed the race from Los Angeles to Honolulu but, because it was a handicap affair, the winner of the event will not be known until three other contestants arrive.

The Talayaha was the first of the six yachts in the race to slip past Diamond Head, the official finish point. It arrived Saturday, but was the scratch boat.

The yacht Pandora crossed the finish line at 10:47 p. m. Monday night but the time has not yet been announced as official. The Tewa came into port early today and the Eagle was expected tonight.

Although they have not been sighted, the Mollolu and the Wotona were believed near the islands and both are conceded a chance to be declared winner of the race after their handicap time was subtracted from the elapsed time.

Both Hudkins And M. Walker Are Confident

CHICAGO, June 20. (AP)—I'll stop Hudkins within six rounds. "I am confident of defeating Walker and winning the middleweight title."

That's the way Mickey Walker, world's middleweight boxing champion, and Ace Hudkins, Nebraska wildcat challenger, sized up each other as they tapered off training today for their title contest at Comiskey field tomorrow night.

Both boxers wound up the strenuous part of their training yesterday. The challenger was not to box today, but was booked to go through some limbering up exercises in a downtown gymnasium while Walker confined his program to a long walk.

Walker has been guaranteed \$75,000 with a privilege of 42 1/2 per cent of the net receipts. Hudkins has been guaranteed \$25,000 with a privilege of 22 1/2 per cent. Promoter Jim Mullen is planning to handle a \$200,000 gate, the largest in the history of the middleweight division.

There is little doubt that he is one of the real pros of the great Yankee ball club but he never has caught on with the New York fans. He so completely ignored the fans and their whims and fancies that they applied the same treatment to him and he is the least discussed of all the Yankee players.

When he makes some phenomenal catch or throws a runner out at the plate with a perfect strike from the rim of the lot, they say—"Well, he ought to." When he fails to get a hit in a pinch or loaf to first, he is excused because "He's a lazy, no good."

He always has been a hard spring hitter and a hustler in his quait way until mid-season and then he became just a spot in the batting order. This year, however, he has been playing an exceptionally good game.

If the St. Louis Cardinals retain their present three-game advantage during the cut throat competition in the west then they must be considered odds-on favorites to repeat their triumph of 1926.

The Cardinals made it two out of three from the second place Reds at Cincinnati yesterday, 3 to 4, and avenged their defeat of Monday.

Dazy Vance pitched just two balls at Philadelphia and Brooklyn went down to defeat 11 to 10. After Jim Elliott had knocked out a home run in the first half of the ninth and given the Phils a one run lead, the Phils put two men on the paths in their half. Vance then was summoned to relieve Elliott. He pitched one wide one. The next one was to the liking of Walter Leland and the ensuing triple down the third base line scored the tying and winning runs. Elliott was charged with the defeat because he had put the runners on base.

In the American league Washington and Boston split even in two games, the Red Sox taking the first, 5 to 1, on Russell's effective pitching, but bowing to the Senators in the second 15 to 7. Washington collected 20 hits in the night cap.
