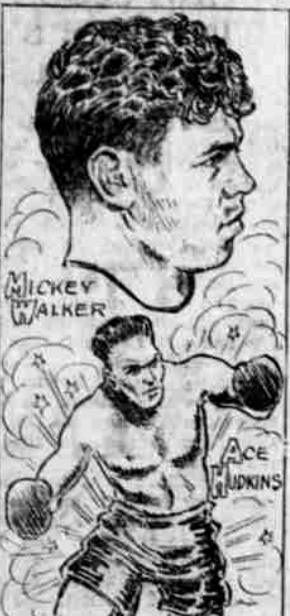

The Hudkins family, which includes seven brothers, two of whom manage his affairs, are with the Ace.

For Walker to win, I figure he must knock out Hudkins inside of four rounds. Always a slow starter, if Hudkins can weather the early rounds he should come on with a rush in the closing ones.

## Ace Rarin' to Go; Walker Is 7-5 Favorite

CHICAGO, June 21. (AP)—The world's middleweight championship goes on the block at Comiskey Park tonight when Mickey Walker answers the challenge of Nebraska's wildcat of the ring, Ace Hudkins.

If weather conditions are favorable, the fight, which is billed to go ten rounds to a decision is expected to attract from 30,000 to 40,000 fans and probably the largest gate receipts in the history of the middleweight division.

It will be Hudkins' first shot at a boxing title in the eight years of his boxing career in three divisions and, while Walker was a 7 to 5 betting favorite the challenger was radiant with confidence. Walker, too, will be confident, in top form and impatient for the bell.

Attracted by the punching power of the New Jersey bulldog and the Nebraska wildcat, Chicago's boxing raiato today was crowded with fans from all sections of the nation.

While they were at variance as to the winner, they were virtually agreed that the fight would end in a knockout. Their opinion was repeated by the champion and challenger.

Other teams may be fighting for mere pennants, but when the Phillies so far forget themselves as to win seven out of nine, they are news.

Not satisfied with Walter Lerrain's triple which outraged Dazzy Vance on Tuesday, the Phils jumped on Jumbo Jim Elliott and Doug McWeeny for enough hits to win the second game of the Brooklyn series yesterday, 6-2.

The Cardinals made it ten out of eleven and increased their lead over the Reds to four full games, by taking the series opener from the Cubs in Chicago 6 to 2.

The Reds slipped further back toward the Giants as the Pirates made up a bit of ground by shading Epps Rixey, 2 to 1. More heartening to Pirate fans than the victory itself was the form of Remy Kremer flashed in achieving it.

The Giants and Braves were rained out at Boston.

After the first two skirmishes of what has been facetiously referred to as a "crucial" series, the Yankees and Athletics are just where they were before it started by splitting a double header 10-5 and 9-3.

In the battle of the lower depths, Washington consolidated its hold on fifth place and menaced fourth by trimming the Red Sox, 3 to 0.

The tail end White Sox divided a pair with the slipping Indians in Cleveland, winning the first, 6 to 4, and lapsing back into normalcy in the second, 4 to 3.
