KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 21. (AP)—Cheered by the 650 pounds of provisions dropped yesterday upon his camp off Northeast land by Major Maddalena, General Umberto Noble today sent further radio directions for the rescue of his stranded party.

The general and the five men with him who have been short of food and in difficult straits ever since May 25, when the dirigible met with disaster on its return from the North Pole, was in wireless communication with the base ship Citta Di Milano concerning the present situation. He gave some instructions about what further procedure is to be followed in rescuing his party and gave details as to what were the conditions on the ice where he is stranded and the exact position of his camp.

Before giving these directions concerning the rescue plans, however, General Noble expressed his gratification of Major Maddalena and the assistant pilot of the Savoia-Marchetta 55, as well as to Major Mercanti, director-general of the Italian aviation department, who organized the relief expedition and gave up his seat in the plane so that more fuel might be carried.

In fact, the first words of Noble's message were:
"I kiss and embrace the two fliers and Mercanti."

There was no further news today regarding Roald Amundsen, the famous explorer who took off from Tromsø, Norway, on Monday night and has been missing since. There were all kinds of speculation about him but no definite information whatever has reached here and there was no confirmation of yesterday's rumor that he was down on the pack ice.

The week of fine weather which has prevailed at Spitzbergen today was succeeded by foggy conditions which it was feared would prevent Major Maddalena from starting out again in search for the balloon party of seven men and three missing men who originally formed part of the Noble group.
