REDS DROP TO FOURTH PLACE AS CARDS WIN

National League Race Develops Into Gruelling Struggle

The National league pennant race is fast becoming a chase with seven clubs vainly trying to match strides with Bill McKechnie's rampaging St. Louis Cardinals.

Old Pete Alexander took his ancient right arm to the mound at Cincinnati yesterday and pitched the Cards to a 7 to 4 victory over the Reds. The Reds dropped to fourth place.

Getting to Remy Kremer for six runs in the third inning, the Cubs baited the on-rushing Pittsburgh Pirates at Chicago 8 to 1. The Giants lost further ground by taking a 3 to 0 beating from Jess Petty and the Brooklyn Robins.

The Yankees stretched their margin over the American league field to 8 and a half games by taking the measure of the Boston Red Sox 1 to 0. George Pipgras turning in a three hit performance for his 13th victory in 15 starts. Babe Ruth hit his 28th homer of the season.

Hadley outpitched George Earnshaw by a wide margin as the Senators took the Philadelphia Athletics into camp at Washington 6 to 3.

George Grant was in rare form and the Cleveland Indians evened the series with the Browns at St. Louis, 4 to 2.

Detroit moved out of the cellar as Owen Carroll blanked the Chicago White Sox with seven hits 6 to 0.

Most-Bossed Baseball Player

"Baseball's most-bossed major league player."

That's the rather unique distinction belonging to old Cy Williams of the much-pummeled Phillies. And to be winning any honors with such a club as the Quakers are wont to put on the field is quite an accomplishment in itself.

Old Cy now is on his 17th big league trail—and is toiling for his 14th major circuit manager. He's had a new pilot for nearly every one of his 17 in top campaigns.

Old Cy came to the majors back in 1912 as a member of the Chicago Cubs. His first boss was the late Frank Chance, who won lasting fame with his great Cub machines of 1906-07-08-10.

That was the Peerless One's final year with the Cubs. The next season Cy had a new chief in scrappy Johnny Evers, another one-time Cub star. Evers lasted only a single campaign and in 1914 Hank O'Day, National league umpire, was appointed manager of the Cubs—and Williams was working for his third boss in as many years.

One chase proved enough for even an umpire and the following season Cy was calling Roger Bresnahan, old Giant catcher, "boss." In 1916 Joe Tinker, still another of the old Cub entourage, was Cy's pilot while in 1917 Fred Mitchell took over the managerial reins, making six bosses for the much-bossed Mr. Williams in six seasons.

Mitchell remain in the pilot's role for three years, but at the end of the 1917 grind old Cy was traded to the Phillies for Dode Paskert—and gained another boss in Pat Moran. The next year came Jack Coombs and Gavvy Cravath as Philly managers and Cy's record went up to nine different bosses in eight campaigns.

Cravath still was Williams' chief in 1920, but in 1921 Bill Donovan was the manager, only to be supplanted by Irwin Wilmhelm later the same year. Then, in 1922, came Art Fletcher, former Giant shortstop, Williams had Fletcher for his boss five years, Stuffy McInnis getting the post a year ago.

That made No. 13 and Cy thought the limit had been reached. But when he reported for work this spring he found No. 14 on the job in Bert Shotton, one-time outfielder of the Browns and Cardinals.

Yes, old Cy Williams has been a much-bossed player. But he has thrived just the same. In fact, bosses mean little or less to the veteran fly-chaser as long as the old optic for tunking baseballs on the moot remains in its accustomed shape.

Williams ranks next to Max Carey as the oldest outfielder in point of service in the National league. Carey has been up one year longer than Cy.

John Farrell Defeats Bobby Jones in Open

CHICAGO, June 25. (AP)—Johnny Farrell, professional, is the newly crowned open golf champion of the United States, having defeated the master marksman, Bobby Jones, king of the amateurs, in a spectacular 36-hole play-off for the championship yesterday, 143 to 144. Thus Farrell, at the age of 27, steps forth today to survey his kingdom and reap the \$50,000 reward that goes with it.

Farrell, from what seemed a hopeless chase after his first 36 holes, came back to gain a tie as Bobby slipped and skidded, on his final round.

Jones, on the last two holes of yesterday's match, shot two successive birdies, but could not break down Farrell's moral or gain a single stroke. Bobby offered no alibis and declared Farrell deserved to win.

E. Johnson Out As Manager of Portland Nine

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25. (UP)—Presumably because of Portland's inability to stay away from the rear end of the second division of the Pacific coast league, Ernie Johnson, has resigned as manager of the local club.

William K. Rodgers, a former Portland Beaver captain and manager of the Sacramento, Denver, Calgary, Albany, Peoria and Little Rock baseball clubs at various times, was appointed as Johnson's successor.

Tilden Climbs Another Notch In Determined Come-Back Try

WIMBLETON, June 25. (AP)—Big Bill Tilden opened his attempted comeback on the tennis courts of Wimbledon today with a smashing victory in the first round of the Wimbledon championships over M. V. Summerston, youthful English player, 6-0, 6-1, and 6-0.

John Hennessey, young American Davis cup star, also swept through to an easy victory, defeating the English player, E. Mather, 6-1, 6-0, 6-2.

Not behind their American friends, the French Davis cup stars, Rene Lacoste and Henri Cochet, also won their opening matches, Lacoste eliminating H. L. Walcott, 6-0, 6-2, 6-2, while Cochet eliminated Mohammed Slem, Indian ranking player, 6-2, 8-6, 6-2.

George Lott, member of the American Davis cup team also had an easy time winning his opening match, defeating F. Crossbie, 6-2, 6-0, 6-0.

Another straight set winner was the Italian ace, Baron H. L. De Morpurgo, who defeated W. L. Breeze, 6-2, 9-7, 6-1 in a first round match. The baron is rated with Tilden and the French as a contender for the championship.

Helen Wills and most of the 79 aspirants for her title as queen of Wimbledon, were in the competitors' grandstand. Their turn comes tomorrow.

DEPOSED VICE PRESIDENT IN MADRID, SPAIN

MADRID, June 25. (UP)—General Jose Vicente Gomez, former vice president of the Venezuelan republic and inspector general of the army, who resigned the inspectorship when President Gomez, his father, abolished the vice presidency as an "unnecessary office," arrived here and was lauded in a public statement by the bishop of Guayana.

The bishop praised General Gomez for his efforts to bring about improvements in Venezuela, and especially his industry in attracting Spanish immigrants to his country.

General Gomez, his family and staff, sailed for Europe after the abolition of the vice-presidency.

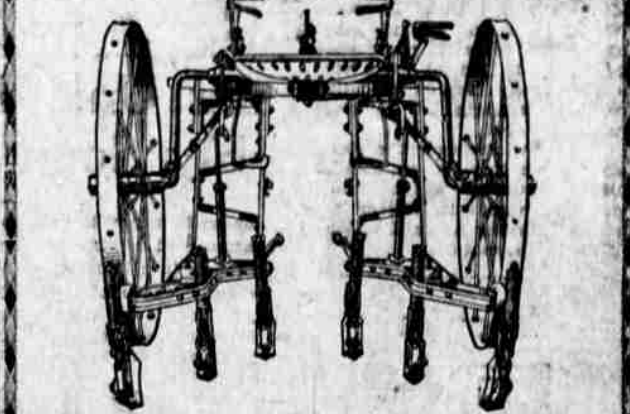
