## JOHNNY RISKO CLOUTS WAY TO CLOSE VICTORY

### Bout Resembles Biblical Fight of David and Goliath

NEW YORK, June 28. (AP)—Johnny Risko, the Cleveland baker boy, was awarded a decision over George Godfrey, successor to Harry Willis as the "black menace," last night at the end of their 10 round go at Ebbetts field, Brooklyn.

Although the verdict of the judges met with only lukewarm approval from 25,000 spectators, several sport writers gave Risko a margin of five rounds with four for Godfrey and one even. The Associated Press score sheet gave the negro giant five rounds, with three for Risko and two even. Risko apparently caught the judge's eyes with a thrilling rally in the last two rounds that had the 235 pound negro giant glad to hold and back away. Neither bore marks of the battle at the close. The match was one of the few financial successes of the rainy summer season of many postponements. Receipts were \$51,254.

"There have been absolutely no negotiations for the purchase of the New York Giants," Stoneham said.

It had been rumored for several days that the Madison Square Garden corporation of which Tex Rickard is president, was negotiating for the acquisition of the Giants, but these rumors have been steadily denied by all officials of the Giants.

We Can't Lose Chicago  
American league magnates are giving more than ordinary attention to the case of the Chicago White Sox. The collapse for one season only of what was once a real institution of the league would not occasion much concern but the magnates think there is nothing temporary in the collapse.

Under conditions as they now exist in Chicago they fear that the Sox will become steadily worse, if that is possible, and that Chicago will become a National league town with the Cubs gaining in public favor.

The magnates are of the opinion that the only solution is an entire reorganization of the club. But Comiskey scorns the suggestions made that he sell the club and retire. He insists that the Sox are to be his monument and he doesn't regard them as the tombstone of the league.

Six Just Drifting  
Comiskey, his fellow magnates believe, has been ill for so many years that he has completely lost his touch with baseball and the men who are running the club are incompetent. They point to the money spent for Cissell as proof of this.

Comiskey's hopes that his son would succeed him have faded and Harry Grabner, the secretary of the club, has succeeded to autocratic control of the club. And even those who like Grabner personally can't see that he has been a success.

In his declining days Comiskey has begun to feel also that all his friends have turned against him and he refuses to trust anyone or listen to any friendly advice.

An Expert Spectator  
If Harry Gill, the star track coach of the University of Illinois, had to wait for recognition from the A. A. U. politicians he never would get a look at the Olympic games. Although Gill stands on his record as one of the three best track coaches in the country today, he was ignored when the Olympic coaches were selected this year.

But Gill is going to Amsterdam.

Sister Wasn't Canceled  
The Washington ball club, since the facts have become known, did a friendly act for George Sliker when waivers were secured on him and it was made possible for him to get into the National league.

Sliker gave everything he had to the Senators and finally told Bucky Harris he was convinced he couldn't win a regular job with the club and he felt sure he could get a new start in the other league. He wanted to know if Bucky would object if he looked around in the National league and Bucky told him he put only would not object, but he would help him.

"The boy was getting broken-hearted," Harris said. "I thought that he would feel better in the other league and I'm glad to see him going so well."
