PUZZLING PLAYS Baseball

MUCH DISPUTED SITUATION When is it possible to score a run on a double play that retires the side?

It is always possible to score a run on any double play that retires the side, provided the third out is not a force-out or a play in which the third man out be retired before reaching first base. To illustrate: There are runners on first and third and one out. The batsman hits a difficult drive to right field that looks as if it would fall safe. The runner on third, playing good baseball, decides to hold that base on the theory that if the ball is caught he can beat the throw to the plate.

The runner on first, feeling sure the ball will not be caught, runs wild. The fielder makes the catch and the runner on third breaks for home. When the ball is caught the runner original on first has reached second.

The fielder throws the ball to first before the runner can return, completing a double play and retiring the side.

On all double plays of this nature the runner can score from third, if he held his base until the ball was caught and crossed the plate before the double play which retired the side was completed.

There was no force about the third out. A force can only occur when the runner must vacate a base to make room for the batsman. The third out was made possible by bad baserunning.

Just remember, a run can always score on any double play in which the third out is not a force play or a play in which the batsman failed to reach first, provided the runner has crossed the plate in advance of the final out.

BOLL-WEEVIL REVIVED

WASHINGTON, June 28. (UP)—The boll-weevil phase of the government cotton reporting system, now being handled jointly by the U. S. weather bureau and the agriculture bureau of entomology, is being revived by Secretary of Agriculture Jardine with a view to further coordination of the work, it was learned today.

ANIMALS GROW FAST
KANSAS CITY, June 28.—Dr. Samuel Brody of the Missouri Agricultural Experiment station has found that a young farm animal grows much faster than a young human. A child, according to Brody, grows but 10 per cent a year between the ages of 4 and 14. A young animal, such as a rabbit, calf or guinea pig, grows 1000 per cent in a year or in one day grows as much as a human in one year.

BAN SHORT SKIRTS
BERLIN June 28.—When Herr George Schaetzen, German minister of communications, issued a decree that women and girls in employ of the civil service should wear skirts extending not less than seven and three-quarter inches below the knee, he caused a lot of trouble. About 37,000 employees of the association of the German Postal and Telegraph company gathered to demand his resignation and start a counter-measure against the regulation.

RUNAWAY KILLS MAN
LONDON, June 28.—A small boy caused the death of Thomas R. Keatley here, in a very unusual case. The boy was running down hill with such momentum that he could not stop himself. He catapulted into Keatley and fractured several ribs. One of the broken bones pierced Keatley's liver, causing his death.

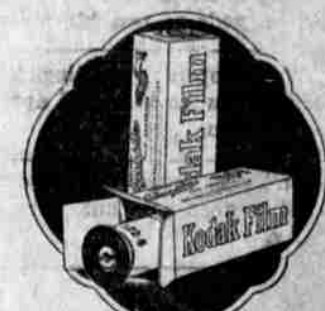
