

WISHARD CASE GOES TO JURY

Fate of Archie L. Wishard, former secretary of the Klamath Irrigation district, and recently a real estate operator, was in the

hands of a circuit court jury this afternoon. Wishard is charged with converting over \$4000 held in trust for two minors, John Albert Elder and Mary Miller Elder, to his own use. He had been appointed administrator of the estate of Albert E. Elder, former Klamath attorney.

Specifically he is charged with larceny by embezzlement. The case opened yesterday afternoon before Circuit Judge Corkins of

Lakeview and drew to a close this afternoon. The jury sitting in judgment on Wishard is composed of R. M. Smith, W. F. Jinnette, Clyde K. Davis, Herbert L. Newby, Arthur H. Whims, Frances Ezell, Lee Crawford, L. C. Fitzgerald, Fred Noel, Hilbert Largent, K. Jones and Joseph Rose.

Wishard emphatically denied that he had converted any of the money to his own use and claimed that it had been expended to discharging monetary obligations against the estate. He could not produce, however, records of how the money had been expended but recalled several items.

AL WIRES CONCLAVE TODAY THAT HE'S AGAINST PROHIBITION.

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from Governor Smith follows: "I received your message on behalf of the convention. With a deep sense of responsibility and a fervent prayer for the guidance of divine providence, I accept the call of my party to lead it in the national campaign. I can think of no greater privilege in this world than to serve our country.

"My gratitude to the convention for its expression of confidence in me I cannot adequately express in this telegram. I will have to make it manifestly single handed devotion to the United States and her people in every section.

"My happiness and welfare of millions of men, women and children who constitute the nation was the great driving force behind the doctrine enunciated by the immortal Jefferson, given life by him and carried through by Cleveland and Wilson.

"I am convinced that our platform voices that doctrine. I stand committed to the platform and will welcome an opportunity to reorganize and make more efficient the agencies of government to the end that the burden of taxation may be lightened."

"Our platform lays at rest the absurd claim insidiously put out by republican propaganda that the republican party has a monopoly upon the mechanics of prosperity. Our platform in its tariff and financial policy gives assurance to every legitimate business man, wage earner, farmer and tax payer that prosperity will not be conserved but fairly distributed among all.

"The definite declaration of the convention to aid agriculture and the planks dealing with labor problems are sound, progressive and sincere as is also the party commitment to the development of our waterpower without alienating our god-given resources. Our plank on foreign policy states the simple truth that the divine command to 'love thy neighbor as thyself' contains no limitation and was intended to apply as between nations.

"The equal and even enforcement of law is the cornerstone upon which rests the whole structure of democratic government. If it is the will of the people of this nation that I am to take as an oath as president of the United States to protect and defend our constitution and laws, I will execute that oath to the limit of my ability without reservation or evasion.

"Common honesty compels us to admit that corruption of law enforcement officials, bootlegging and lawlessness are not prevalent throughout this country. I am satisfied that without returning to the old evils that grew from the saloon, which years ago I held and still hold was and ought always to be a defunct institution in this country, by the application of the democratic principles of local self government and states rights, we can secure real temperance respect for law and eradication of the existing evils.

"In my formal acceptance of your nomination I shall give to the people of the country my views in full upon all of the issues of the campaign. In the way that I know that you can do it, give the delegates my warmest thanks for the confidence they have reposed in me and my assurance that with their support I confidently expect to lead the historic democratic party to victory in November."
