More Saps Get Foolish

In the California Woolgrower, two letters are printed, one from a mine owner and the other from some chap who knows about as much as the proverbial "last year's bird's nest." Those letters upbraid the cattle and sheep men for using the highways to trail their livestock bands from one point to another. One of these two remarkable men almost screams in his article that livestock men build no roads, that they are the worst of road hogs, and that they do not seek trails for their stock but insist on driving on the highways.

Isn't it too bad that these highbrow birds cannot have an island upon which to live where such a vulgar thing as a producer of meat and wool or working man would not intrude? Is it not too bad that the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights did not set out specifically that men of this type should be monarchs of the world and all the rest of us should be serfs.

In Klamath county, Oregon, the automobile driver who does not respect a band of sheep or a herd of cattle being driven from different points is considered a no-good citizen; and he is just that. He has no standing in society and he does not last long in this country. We hope the state of Oregon will never so far forget herself as to allow any people like these Californians who talk in the Woolgrower, to get a foothold in this commonwealth.

The man who is handling a band of sheep or a number of head of cattle is producing something for society, whether he be a resident of California or of Oregon, and that is probably more than either of these thin-brained objectors are doing.

Oregon highways are open to stockmen when they need them to transport their herds from one point to another. It is a pleasure for most Oregon people to stop on the highway and admire a band of sheep as it passes.

Lack of Decent Thought

The Salvation Army has sent a letter to The Evening Herald telling of people who are wearing the Army uniform, soliciting funds in Oregon, explaining that these same people have no connection with the religious organization.

Klamath Falls had another instance of a woman masquerading in a religious uniform to collect money for herself.

It is hard to get the angle of such people. Impersonating ordinary citizens for gain is bad enough but when men and women sink so low as to use the religious garb of any denomination or sect in order to pry loose a few dollars for personal gain, then we will have to admit that a certain section of humanity has sunk lower than seems possible.

Prosecution of such acts will do little good, for the lack of decent thought is their trouble. The lack of that little thing called conscience has dragged them down lower than the criminal who cracks a safe, breaks a lock in your home or holds you up at the point of a gun.

and retired to his hotel while his nomination was being consummated.

Those who first proposed the Arkansas senator and democratic senate floor leader to balance off the Smith ticket argued that he would strengthen the party in both south and west, and that argument went like wild fire. It was in the south that opposition to the nomination of Smith centered until the very end and it is to the west that both republicans and democrats are looking for the answer to their questionings about the farm relief issue.

A big voiced forceful campaigner, Robinson glories in the combat of political stump speaking. He is an active figure in senate debate, where he occupies the same position of titular leadership on the democratic side that Senator Curtis of Kansas, the republican vice presidential nominee, has among republican senators. Thus two men who have matched wits and strategy across the party aisle, and have remained good personal friends through out, are to try conclusions in another arena, with the presiding officer's chair in the senate chamber at stake.

Robinson is a dry and in his speech as permanent chairman of the convention he warned his party against listening to pleas for a modification plank in the platform. In the same speech he started a tremendous Smith demonstration by quoting Jefferson and the constitution in support of religious equality.

He supported the McNary-Hau-

gen bill in the last session of congress and voted to pass it over President Coolidge's veto.

So overwhelmingly was the landslide today that when his column was added at the end of the first ballot, it totaled more than 500 of the 1100 in the whole convention. Immediately his two nearest rivals, Senator Barkley of Kentucky with 77 votes and Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross of Wyoming with 33 withdrew their names and asked that the votes given them be credited to Robinson.

Other changes to the Arkansas senator came in so rapidly that the tally clerks could not keep track of them and in the end it amounted virtually to a nomination by acclamation.

the preferential vote for democratic national committeeman for Oregon, and now facing a contest for the position at Houston, today sharply rebuked the Oregon delegation when he dispatched a telegram to Chairman Shaver of the democratic national committee.

"News reports indicate that notwithstanding my election as national committeeman by the people of this state and the fact that my credentials are in your hands, you are giving ear to . . . (the man) . . . who I defeated for the office of committeeman."

HOUSTON, Tex., June 29. (AP)—As the democratic national convention entered into what was expected to be the final day's sessions, indications were seen that Oswald West would be reported as Oregon's selection for national committee man.

The Oregon delegates regardless of their opinion of West's desirability of Oregon's member of the national committee, apparently in most cases had reached the conclusion that they had no alternative under the state primary law but to submit his name to the convention.

vote by which the New York was chosen, only five states appear as having failed to give the leader at least a part of their support and one of them was Reed's own state of Missouri, which was blocked by convention rules when it sought to turn the band wagon movement to Smith into a nomination by acclamation. The others were Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Texas—representing the remnants of what the anti-Smith leaders had once hoped to build into an irresistible bonedry and anti-Tammany phalanx against the nomination of the governor.

It really was Ohio that consummated the nomination. When the first call of the roll had been completed, Smith's total stood at 724 2-3, or nine short of the number needed to nominate. But having paid their tribute to their respective favorite sons, a half dozen states were ready to change their votes and get aboard the band wagon. For several minutes a presidential nomination hung in the air while delegation chairmen from all sections of the hall tried to shout each other down in their rival attempts to be first to switch to Smith. Chairman Meeker of Ohio, standing on his chair in the right center of the delegate section, won out, and cast for the New York governor 44 Ohio votes where he had had but one on the initial roll call.

Mississippi, Indiana, Nebraska, Kansas and Tennessee quickly followed giving Smith votes he no longer needed and reducing the anti-Smith residual to but 250 of the convention's total strength of 1109 delegates.
