LAKEVIEW HAS GREAT FUTURE

Lakeview today is in much the same position that Klamath Falls was in three years ago. This is the opinion of W. H. Perkins, publisher of the Lake County Tribune, who was a visitor here today.

"With the new standard gauge railroad now running trains into Lakeview with countless rumors and reports of more railroads to be built, and with the sheep and cattle industry in a highly prosperous condition, Lakeview this year is in its element," he said.

"Many new business establishments have been started in Lakeview this year. All of them seem to be prospering. There had been some little doubt as to whether a chain store could operate successfully in a community which is not in the habit of paying cash, but the advent of Stone's Cash Store has shown that Lakeview is no different than any other town."

Mr. Perkins commented on the fact that Lakeview at the present time had not adequate power facilities for extensive lumber operations and an effort is now being made to induce The California Oregon Power company to enter that territory.

The present company operating there has been refused a franchise, he said, and the city is now in the frame of mind to install a municipal plant, providing Copco can be induced to extend its power line to that territory.

"Lakeview has been waiting for this sort of development for so long that now it can hardly realize it has arrived," he continued. "The people realize that there must be a reduction in power rates, in freight rates and in telegraph and telephone rates in order to compete commercially with other sections of Oregon."

Mr. Perkins formerly was news editor and later advertising manager of The Herald. He established the Lake County Tribune, a semi-weekly, less than three months ago, and he has become one of the most ardent Lake county enthusiasts who ever traveled over the Devil's Garden.

DRYS MOBILIZE AGAINST SMITH

the action which they proposed. Meanwhile, Josephine Daniels, an ardent dry, who served as secretary of the navy under President Wilson, issued a statement criticizing Governor Smith for the message which he sent to the convention before its adjournment yesterday in which he reiterated his stand for fundamental changes in the legislative provisions of the prohibition law.

Daniels declared the governor's statement "unnecessary and ill timed." He asserted that it felt like "an apple of discord" upon a convention in which "good feeling and unity prevailed."

Senator Walsh of Montana, a dry himself, and at one time an opponent of Governor Smith for the nomination expressed approval of the convention's choice, terming Governor Smith "the most striking character that has appeared on the political stage since Roosevelt."

McAdoo, who withdrew from the political arena last fall, would make no comment on the nomination.

The party "acted wisely" in the opinion of James M. Cox, the presidential nominee of 1920, in selecting Governor Smith as its standard bearer.

"Since he was the outstanding candidate, met all the requirements of character and capacity for high station," he said, "we would not have deserved the right to even mention the name of Jefferson if we cowed before the same sort of bigotry that Jefferson so bitterly despised."

Mrs. Woodrow Wilson added her good wishes and congratulations to the multitude of felicitations received by the New York governor.

"I congratulate you on your nomination," she wired him, "and heartily wish for your success."

To this, Governor Smith replied that no other congratulatory message touched him more or made him feel more grateful.

"If I could leave behind me," he said, "an approach to the noble record of service made by Woodrow Wilson, your husband, then my efforts shall not have been useless."

opening, with the installation of an entire new kitchen, including electric broiling machines, toasters, dish washing and dish drying machines. Another added feature to the kitchen department is the cold storage plant taking in a space of 18x20 feet.

Along the front entrance of the grill an enlarged counter of beautiful oak carried out in the soft grey tones has been installed.

ed. The counter is 45 feet in length with a cold storage system installed along the walls. To the back of the grill 12 good sized booths which will accommodate close to 50 guests were being installed this morning. In the center floor space to the back large tables are being placed, so that more than 125 people can be taken care of at one time.

A banquet room for special parties is being refurnished in the basement.

For more than seven years Mr. Hershberger has been actively and successfully engaged in the cafe business in this city. He was first located in the Rex Cafe and for the past four and one-half years owned The Club on Main and Sixth which closed with the opening of the new grill by Mr. Hershberger.

"I had hoped we would be able to open today, but since a number of our electrical fixtures are not quite fully installed I feel it is better to open Sunday noon," Mr. Hershberger stated. "It will be our aim to give the best service possible in the future just as we have in the past."
