PORTLAND WINS DOUBLE HEADER FROM OAKLAND

Pitcher Proves to Be Hero of First Game; Wetzel Easy in Second

Visiting Club Gets 50 Percent Gate Receipts

One of the most frequent questions asked me by fans is how the gate receipts are divided between the home team and the visitors.

The visiting baseball club gets fifty per cent of the money taken in from the sale of general admission tickets. The home team gets more money because they keep the entire amount of the difference between the general admission tickets and the box seat tickets.

A number of years ago every ticket taken in was figured at twenty-five cents, the old-time bleacher admission price, and the visitors received twelve and one-half cents for each paid admission, the home team of course making the grand stand and box seats extra.

This was later changed to promote the building of box seats and grandstands and force owners to improve their baseball stands for selfish commercial reasons if they had no altruistic or sporting ones.

FIND AVIATOR STILL AT HELM

ELSINORE, Mo., July 2. (AP)—Still grasping the shattered "stick" of his airplane and with a packet of democratic convention pictures at his side, Leslie Smith, crack air mail pilot of St. Louis was found dead with his wrecked plane on a wooded hillside near here yesterday.

The plane was shattered to bits, the fuselage and wings clinging to a tree, the motor and undercarriage having landed fifty feet beyond.

A parachute strapped to Smith was untouched, giving rise to the belief that he had probably lost control of his ship at a low altitude. This theory was further borne out by a path through the tops of oak trees which had been clipped off by the plane as it swooped to the ground. That Smith was killed by a bolt of lightning before his plane crashed was the opinion of his employer Frank H. Robertson, general manager of Robertson Aircraft company, St. Louis.

TRUCK DRIVER DIES IN CRASH

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2. (AP)—Carl Turney, 42, a Portland newspaper truck driver, was fatally injured, and his son Raymond, 16, was in a hospital here today in a serious condition, the result of a head on collision between Turney's truck and a street car. The accident occurred at 1:30 today. Turney died three hours later.

The truck, heavily laden, crashed into the one-man street car which had just discharged passengers.

SECOND PLACE BATTLES PROVE CLOSEST RACES

Yanks Prove They Can Lick Philadelphia as Often as They Like

By The Associated Press While the Yanks lead their closest rivals in the American league by thirteen and a half games and the Cards are ahead in the national by three and a half games, most of the other clubs are battling desperately for positions as close to the leaders as can be secured. The standings from second place down show one or more shifts almost daily and threaten to continue to do so until the final curtain is rung down.

In the American league, only 12½ games separate Detroit in last place from Philadelphia in second. In the National the Giants, in runner-up position, lead the Pittsburgh Pirates in sixth by eight and a half games.

The Yanks yesterday removed what doubt, if any, remained as to their ability to beat the Athletics just about as often as they want to. Both ends of a double header went to the champions 12 to 6 and 8 to 4. Lou Gehrig hit two home runs in the first game, his 17th and 18th of the season and Tony Lazzari, duplicated the feat in the night cap.

The St. Louis Browns failed to take advantage of this double reverse for the Athletics for they permitted Detroit to score five runs in the eighth and a 7-4 triumph at Detroit. The standing shows the Browns only two and a half games back of the A's. George Burns homer with two on in the sixth gave Cleveland the verdict over the Chicago White Sox, 5 to 2. The Indians announced the unconditional release of Garland Buckeye, mammoth right hander, who has failed to round into form this season.

Boston moved to within a single game of the fourth place Indians by taking Washington into camp twice, 2 to 1 and 7 to 1.

The national league program saw the Cards end all square after a double header with Donie Bush's Corsairs of Pittsburgh. Fred Fussell blanked the Cards in the first game 2 to 0. The Cards made four errors and were out-hit 13-11 in the second but pulled it out of the fire 8 to 6, chiefly because home runs by Frisch and Bottomley and five doubles were in their hit column.

Eppa Rixey pitched the Cincinnati Reds back into third place with a 4 to 1 triumph over the Chicago Cubs.

Brooklyn dropped into fourth position two points ahead of the Cubs, when the Braves pounded Clark, Moss and McWeeny for 14 hits and nipped the Robins 8 to 7.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 2. (AP)—A Seattle attorney, a young woman of Portland, Ore., and a man of Centralia, Wash., were drowned last night in Lake Washington when a motorboat in which they were cruising capsized.

The dead were Edward Comyns, Seattle attorney; Miss Vivian Lewis, 24, a stenographer of Portland, and Charles Shoemaker, 28, of Centralia.

Mrs. Shoemaker and Lee S. MacDonald, caretaker of Comyns' home on Mercer Island, who were also in the boat, managed to clamber on top of the overturned boat and were saved. Miss Lewis' body was discovered caught on the propeller when a launch started towing the capsized craft to shore.

SAN FRANCISCO MAN IS KILLED IN AUTO CRASH

SAN FRANCISCO, July 2. (AP)—Lester S. Bray, 44, of San Francisco was killed and "Mrs. Bray and the couple's 9 year old daughter were injured, as were four other persons, in a three-cornered automobile accident here last night.

Police said a machine driven by Mario Rossi of South San Francisco struck Bray's car, and then crashed into one driven by Harry McSally, of San Francisco. Rossi also was injured, and hospital physicians said he was under the influence of liquor. A police guard was set to watch him in the hospital.

I'M FINE. HOW'S THE KING?

Complaining that government subsidies, such as were awarded to the German, French and Swedish Olympic teams force real British amateurs to compete against professionals, W. J. Bailey, coach of the British Olympic team, says his boys will have no chance to win at Amsterdam.

Commenting upon the American team, which he admits is financed by popular subscription like the British teams, he complains nevertheless as follows:

"It is well known that some of the athletes who oppose us in the Olympic games are open to suspicion. In America, any brilliant young athlete, footballer, or boxer, can get a free university education because competition between the varsities is so keen that it is a matter of advertisement to win the athletic contests. Those who are given facilities they could not afford to pay for are not really amateurs. They get free training and coaching and that would disqualify them under the strict English rules."

"Most of the British athletes who oppose these young men are forced to work, and work hard, for a living. They can spare only a limited time for training, and I know, through my coaching duties this year, that many of them can get time off to go to Amsterdam only with difficulty."

OLD LEGS AND TENDER HEART

American League players who have watched the Athletics say that Connie Mack's team won't do this year and will be clear out next year.

They give him credit for having some fine pitching and a fine infield defense, but they say that sure outs against other outfielders have been going for doubles against the slow-footed outfielders.

Speaker and Cobb, they say, have given away more runs than they could knock in and the younger members of the team are not as fast on their feet as a championship club has to be.

And they say that the club is not overburdened with heart.

TOY WHISTLE TOOTERS

Winners and second place men in the eastern intercollegiate and the New England district championships qualify automatically for the final Olympic trials at Harvard in July but the middle-western athletes have been

given to understand that those who were one-two in the Western Conference championship meet and the national intercollegiate championships did not so qualify. And if they don't run again some place they will be out of luck.

It seems that not only the political protestants of the A. A. U. are to be dealt with summarily, but that even a great athlete has to bend his knees or get a lash. Lloyd Hahn, who couldn't possibly be kept off the Olympic team, didn't run in the New England meet and the A. A. U. district ward heaters refused to place him on the team to be sent to the final trials.

It was just a petty little political trick, however, as the Boston A. A. stepped right up and produced the car fare for Hahn.

In 1932 there should be a series of trials for managers, but when the finals arrived there might be no candidates surviving.
