the other men on the ice floe have been rescued.

BERLIN, July 6. (AP)—How the Swedish aviator Lieutenant Lundborg, marooned with the Nobile survivors on an ice floe near Fom Island, was rescued, was told briefly in a dispatch to the Lokal Anzeiger from Virgo Bay.

With great daring two Swedish planes penetrated the fog to the Nobile encampment and dropped provisions. The pilot of one plane, believed to be Lieutenant Stryberg, observing open water, decided to risk a landing. He succeeded in this and took Lundborg aboard and rejoined the other plane.

As the weather is improving, there is hope that the remainder of the group may be saved within a short time.

Pilot Killed.

LONDON, July 6. (UP)—The air ministry announced that a pilot had been killed and a mechanic injured in the crash of a military airplane at Mosul Wednesday.
