NEW ORLEANS, La., July 6. (UP)—Seven people were missing from their homes here last night and relatives feared a repetition of the tragedy of several weeks ago when nine people, members of two families, were drowned when their automobile plunged off the highway into a bayou during an outing.

State highway police and relatives and friends of the missing people began a search for the seven today, covering the highway between New Orleans and Slidell, La., 50 miles north of here.

The missing were: L. Bossier, 30; Mrs. L. Bossier, 29; the Bossier's 14-month-old son; Albert Ross, 25; Miss Olive Bossier, 20, sister of L. Bossier; Miss Bertha Luthringshausen, 25; and a man named Brady.

Without warning on a long straight stretch of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway near Pinehurst, a large deer dashed headlong into the automobile of Mr. and Mrs. M. Stewart Biden, Tuesday evening, as they were enroute to Rogue River, turning their car completely over, injuring both of the occupants and killing the deer instantly.

In attempting to avoid the animal, Mr. Biden turned into the bank. The turn was made too late for the deer had already crashed into the car, breaking nearly every bone in its body.

Mr. and Mrs. Biden were pinned beneath the wreck machine. They suffered severe cuts and bruises about the body. Motorists enroute to the valley aided them in clearing themselves from the auto. Mrs. Biden is suffering from a severely cut arm while Mr. Biden's most serious injury is his eye which was badly cut when a bolt from the steering wheel cut the eye ball badly. It was feared for a time he might lose his eye sight.

Local Couple Hurt As Auto Strikes Deer

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Government Reform Measures Fail To Meet Requirements; Sponsor Is Broken Hearted

SALEM, Ore., July 6. (AP)—After raking and scraping about several western Oregon counties until midnight in an effort to get enough electoral signatures to place his governmental reform bills on the November ballot, Representative Hector MacPherson of Albany was forced to give up the fight. The people will not vote on this brace of bills in the next election but MacPherson doubts as yet again introduced them at the 1929 legislature.

MacPherson was sick at heart at the failure of his bills to qualify. He appeared at the office of Secretary of State Koser at five o'clock yesterday afternoon with several thousand names but a check showed that the petitions were about 4,000 short of the required 12,228.

Several petitions were yet to come in from Clackamas and other counties. But such as come in were too meagre to meet the legal requirement.

The MacPherson bills were companion measures, one a proposed constitutional amendment, the other a simple initiative bill, providing for organization of the state government into ten bureaus with the governor at the head.

Eight measures qualified for the ballot. They were:

Senator Dunne's two bills affecting the state highway fund. One reduces motor vehicle license fees about half, and the other increases the gasoline tax from 3 to 5 cents.

The farmer-laborer income tax bill, doubtless the most important measure to go on the ballot.

The farmer-laborer proposed constitutional amendment to curb the legislature in its authority to amend or repeal acts passed by vote of the people.

Four bills sponsored by the sportsmen of the state prohibiting future appropriation of water rights for power or reclamation purposes from the Deschutes, McKenzie, Rogue and North Umpqua rivers.
