FAIR HELEN OF AMERICA STILL TENNIS QUEEN

Chicago Cubs, Led by Hack Wilson, Slub Way to Victory

WIMBLEDON, England, July 7.—Helen Wills, American tennis star, retained her championship in the women's singles at Wimbledon today, defeating Senorita Elia De Alvarez, brilliant young Spanish player before a huge crowd which included the king and queen.

The Spanish girl made a wonderful effort in the second set and had a three-love lead before the champion steadied and ran out six straight games.

Senorita Alvarez, who has been suffering from an attack of laryngitis, seemed anything but a sick girl as she extended Miss Wills to a greater effort than she has been forced to exert before this year.

The challenger exhibited a faultless back hand and sent low, raking shots skimming past the nets until the middle of the second set when her game suffered a collapse.

PICKERING MAY INCREASE HIS STAND, REPORT

According to well-grounded rumors prevalent in Klamath Falls and Alturas, the W. R. Pickering Lumber company is to take over the entire timber holdings of the Red River Lumber company in Modoc county, California.

The deal, it is said, will involve 240,000 acres of land, upon which there is a quantity of timber which will bring the total of the Pickering holdings in Modoc county to eight billion feet.

The mill which the Pickering company will erect at Alturas will have an annual capacity of 150,000,000 b. m. It is said, and the combined holdings of the two companies in this district will furnish the Pickering mill with timber for a period of between 55 and 60 years, it is believed.

A billion feet of this timber might have been manufactured in Klamath, it was thought, if the Walker-Hovey mill materializes.

GRAHAM TAKES NEW LOCATION

A. F. Graham, who for a number of years has been one of the city's large wholesale building supply men, has moved from his original location on Klamath avenue between Fourth and Fifth streets, and is now located with a retail store and offices on South Ninth street.

The new A. F. Graham warehouse has been completed on Spring street, and wholesale business is being handled from there.

COVER PLACED OVER HOT POOL

A spot not far from the city limits, across the canal from Mills addition, where a large hot spring bubbles up, forming a deep, scalding pool of water, and which for many years has been a menace, has now been covered for safety.

The pool was a sight worth seeing with its clear water, always bubbling, but overshadowing this was the fact that several humans and a number of household pets had met their death in the hot springs. Also the springs are located where many campers and tourists stop in order to use the hot water. Soft, sloping banks extending around the pool made it extremely dangerous to persons dipping water.

At present there is only a covering of wide boards, but hope is held that in the future a cement wall and top will not only provide a covering, but improve the appearance of the grounds.

NEW YORK, July 7. (UP)—Urban Shocker, veteran spitball pitcher, was given his unconditional release by the New York Yankees today. Shocker won 18 games and lost 6 last year, but worked in most of his games as a relief hurler. All clubs waived on him, and he left today for his home in the west.
