



PIRATES TRIM GIANTS AGAIN AS CARDS WIN

St. Louis Tightens Hold on First Place; Yanks and Browns Split

Perhaps the Pittsburgh Pirates aren't going anywhere in particular this year but they seem determined to keep the National league championship in the west. Bowling over the New York Giants for the third time in a row, yesterday, the Corsairs thereby earned a vote of thanks from the St. Louis Cardinals who took occasion to beat the Boston Braves again and stretch their lead to four and one-half games. Burleigh Grimes was the thorn in McGraw's side yesterday. The spitballer, traded to the Pirates for Vic Aldridge, has faced his former team mates three times this year and beaten them every time. The score of his latest victory was 5 to 2.

Homer's Feature Game
Two homers, accounting for five runs, featured the Cardinals' 8 to 5 triumph over the Braves. Jim Bottomley hit his 19th of the year with two on. A thumb injury kept Frank Frisch on the Cardinal bench for the first time since he joined the club in April, 1927.

The Cincinnati Reds, holding the third rung in the standing, drew up to within eight percentage points of the Giants, with their third straight decision over the Phillies, five to four.

Dazzy Vance Wins
Dazzy Vance pitched the Brooklyn Robins to their third win in the five-game series with the Chicago Cubs, 5 to 2.

The American league campaign saw the New York Yankees lead shaved to 11 games when the champions split a double header with the St. Louis Browns 6-4 and 12-6, while the Philadelphia Athletics were crushing Cleveland 14-4.

Al Thomas bested Sad Sam Jones in a pitching duel at Washington, the Chicago White Sox rallying away with a 3 to 1 decision.

The Boston Red Sox took both ends of a double bill with Detroit, four to nothing and 8 to 2.

His luck continued, and the president catalogued the day as one of the most successful fishing days since his arrival in Wisconsin.

The champions and near champions who were born late enough to box in these days are certainly lucky. John L. Sullivan didn't get a smooth time when he lost his title to Jim Corbett at New Orleans, but before Gene Tunney steps in the ring with Tom Heeney, every penny of the \$525,000 purse will be in the bank for him. And if one bout goes the limit, that works out to \$11,666.67 a minute.

Tom Heeney, the challenger, will make as much in that one fight as the great old timers like Bob Fitzsimmons, Tom Sharkey, Peter Maher, Gus Ruhlin, Peter Jackson and Kid McCoy made in a lifetime.

In the big money class of athletes, Babe Ruth is probably the most underpaid of the lot. Herk Pennock, Grover Alexander, and Dazzy Vance, figuring salary, really receive more money for the individual game they pitch than Ruth does for the individual game in which he takes part.

They Use the Pad and Pencil To Get the Edge on Opponents

No fighter has ever been kept down by a smack on the whiskers from a fountain pen. No 50-foot putt with a lead pencil has ever won a national open and Babe Ruth never could make 72 grand a year with his typewriter.

This expenditure of words is traveling a long distance to get rid of some evidence that the old gag that the pen is mightier than the sword was, at the time of its invention, and still is, baloney by any slice.

But the pen, in these queer days of delirium in sport, is becoming an important weapon in the equipment of fighters, tennis, baseball and football players and golfers. Science is taking the place of strength, brain is beating brawn and strategy is following blue prints instead of brute instinct.

Jack Dempsey never scouted his opponents. He never wanted to see them in action before he got in with them. He never mapped a battle plan with pencil and paper.

"What's the use of that fancy stuff?" he used to say. "You get in there with it all figured out. You get slammed on the jaw and you forget all about it. You gotta take it as it comes. Get the other guy. That's the only way to be smart."

In contrast is the case of the current champion, Gene Tunney. He scouted and studied every opponent he ever met. He boasted that he had studied Dempsey so closely he knew just how to beat him and he couldn't miss. And he went out and proved it.

Tunney, however, never has seen Tom Heeney, the man he is to fight this month, and he never had a chance to study him.

But that didn't stop him. He got the movies of all Heeney's fights and in the quiet of the mountain night up in Speculator he has the reels turned for him and he sits there with pencil and paper and writes down the finish of the challenger.

The pen and pencil always

have been welcome table utensils for the baseball athletes after a heavy meal on the club, but it is only lately that scientific duties have been assigned to the scribbler. And the colleges are to blame for it.

Haskell Billings, a big fellow with collegiate windshields, went from Brown University to the Detroit Tigers to do some pitching and with him he took a new trick.

He was prepared to apply some "smart" to his job. Sitting on the bench he listened to the "doss and dems" about opposing batters as they were discussed on the bench and he wrote them all down.

To the list of weaknesses of American League batters that he picked up from eavesdropping he added those he discovered by actual experience and now he has a well-filled little book containing what not to throw at all the batters. And he's not ashamed to pull it out of his shirt and look at it in a pinch.

Rene Lacoste, the world's tennis champion, has a regular catalog of the strong and weak points of every ranking tennis player in the world. For ten years he has made entries under each name and in every tournament he turns to his opponent's page and gives it a good heavy study before he goes out to the court.

Football has been scouted and noted to the last bottle of ink. The Harvard Athletic association has a diagram and a record of every play used in every Harvard game for years. In a few years a small building will be necessary as a reference library for the boys who want to study to be a quarterback.

Golf's greatest and foremost sin is committed with a pencil. It is not recorded that Bobby Jones or Hagen or Sarazen use a double entry system of bookkeeping on their game. But if the mental notes "do this" and "don't do that" made by the average golfer were placed end to end and up and down there would be a paved road to Fiji.

Texas Jurist Under Fire As Crusading Baptist Ministers Charge Malfeasance In Office

DALLAS, Tex., July 10, (UP)—A crudely constructed, tin-roofed and wall-less tabernacle, erected before the wheels of the law could get in motion to halt construction, was filled to overflowing here to hear the Rev. J. Frank Norris, crusading Baptist, deride Dallas courts.

Loitering near the structure were several deputy sheriffs armed with warrants to arrest anyone who might attempt to resume construction on the rather frail religious temple.

The score of women who worked frantically Friday tacking a tin roof on the tabernacle before the officers could have their warrants amended to include women workers as well as men, "rested" today.

Norris declared in his sermon Saturday evening that the women would resume work on the

temple today in defiance of a temporary injunction forbidding erection of the building. Rev. Earl Anderson, pastor of the fundamental Baptist congregation, which constructed the temple, spent his fourth day in jail today under a contempt of court sentence assessed him by district judge Towne Young for violating the injunction.

Norris also reiterated his threat to relate in a sermon Monday night certain incidents which would reflect upon Judge Young unless Rev. Anderson is permitted to preach from the county jail steps.

Anderson, who chews tobacco while passing the time in jail, said his attorney would appeal to the state supreme court Monday for a writ of habeas corpus.

LUMBER BROKER FIRM WILL BE STARTED SOON

Plans for a branch office in Klamath Falls of the Western Lumber Warehousing company were outlined yesterday by Hart W. Palmer, Portland, secretary of the company. The company issues a certificate on lumber stored in the mill yards, which is used as collateral in raising money. Mr. Palmer stated yesterday.

The plan is new in this territory, it is said, but the company has been operating for several years in and around Portland, Bend, La Grande and Baker. Small mills can, by this plan, it is said, raise money quickly and easily, without going through the formality and expense of floating a bond issue.

Mr. Palmer is a veteran in the lumber business, having spent several years as superintendent for the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber company in Tacoma, Wash.

YOUNG HEBREW PUG BEEFS FOR MIX WITH TOM

Ballyhoo Sounds Loudly for Armand Emanuel, Young Light Heavy

NEW YORK, July 10, (UP)—

Before taking his fighting son, Armand Emanuel, back home to San Francisco, Charles Emanuel, manager of the young Hebrew light heavyweight, today challenged Tommy Loughran, 175-pound champion, to a title match.

Convinced that boxing contests are not drawing well in the East, Emanuel announced his son was ready to meet Loughran, Leo Lomski, Pete Latzo, or any other outstanding light heavyweight on the Pacific coast.

While in New York Emanuel fought twice, winning a decision over Mike McTigue, former 175-pound title holder, and losing a decision to Loughran in a non-title bout. Charles Emanuel, however, went on record today as one who thought Loughran received an unjustified decision.

"Armand most decisively defeated Loughran," the father said, "and I am backed up in this statement by men like Jim Corbett, Joe Humphries, Jimmy Johnston, Billy Gilson and Frank Churchill. There were approximately five good blows struck in the fight, and I say those blows were struck by Emanuel. The whole thing was a boxing stand-point, and Armand had the edge."

Loughran at present faces two title matches within the next month, meeting Pete Latzo at Wilkesbarre, Pa., July 16, and Leo Lomski at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, August 8.

Lewis Forced To Hustle To Retain Crown

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 10, (AP)—Ed (Strangler) Lewis had a busy evening defending his world's heavyweight wrestling title against Marin Plestina, Chicago, last night. He won, but only after going three falls.

The champion used a series of headlocks to pin the Chicago grappler for the first fall in 27 minutes and 24 seconds. Plestina took the second in 17 minutes and 57 seconds with a croch and half Nelson. The same hold was employed by Lewis to take the deciding fall in seven minutes, 21 seconds.

In taking the second fall, Plestina locked his fists and brought them down with terrific force on the back of Lewis' neck. The blow pitched the champion face downward to the mat and before he could get out of danger, Plestina pinned him with a croch and half Nelson.

Nick Lutze, former Notre Dame athlete, defeated Cowboy Jack McCarthy in 12 minutes and 14 seconds in a preliminary.

Wills-Lenglen Revenge Tilt Being Boomed

NICE, France, July 10, (UP)—

Commenting upon reports that Helen Wills had represented herself as willing to play a "revenge" tennis match with Suzanne Lenglen if it could be arranged under auspices of the American Lawn Tennis association, Mlle. Lenglen's father said Suzanne "won easily enough last time, and I see no reason why she should not be glad to play again."

Mlle. Lenglen now is touring Germany and her father did not know her exact whereabouts. He was surprised that Miss Wills was willing to play her.

PARIS, July 10, (UP)—President Canel of the French Lawn Tennis federation said today he would refuse to permit a Wills-Lenglen match to be staged here. The French regulations forbidding an amateur playing professionals was especially framed when Mlle. Lenglen joined C. C. Pyle's professional troupe in the United States.

Fugazy predicts 35,000 persons will see the Morgan-Martin bout, despite three postponements.

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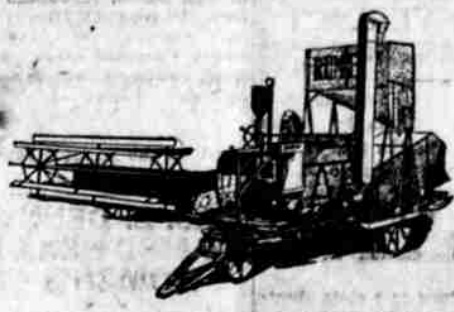


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
