PELICAN FLYING CLUB PLANNED
The Pelican Flying club is being organized in Klamath Falls and young men entering it will be able to learn to fly and become pilots at one-third the cost of the regular flying school fee. This was announced today by A. T. Shere, head of the local Eaglerock Sales company, and one of the best pilots in the west. The club plan advanced is not new. It is the plan the Canadian government is using to develop flyers, and also is being used among the high schools of California. Under its provisions those belonging can fly any time the manager designates and that will be determined by the turns, each taking his turn in the air. The management will be wholly local as the club upon organization will elect its officers and become a distinct organization. While Mr. Shere will be the advisor and instructor, together with his pilots, he will not participate in the club management after once it is formed. An Eaglerock plane will become the property of the club and ownership of that plane will remain permanently within the club members. Considerable encouragement has already been given the club plan and before the week is over it is expected that the membership will be filled. Only fifteen members are allowed in a single club.
