OLYMPIC TEAM OFF FOR MEET IN AMSTERDAM

American Athletes Given Tremendous Ovation as Ship Sails

NEW YORK, July 11. (AP)—To the accompaniment of the flaring of hands, blowing of whistles and expressions of optimism from all hands, the American Olympic team sailed at noon today aboard the President Roosevelt for the games at Amsterdam.

The big liner, bedecked with the flags of all nations and with "American Olympic team" painted on it in letters five feet high was accompanied down the bay by the municipal tug Macom. Its departure was the occasion of a tremendous ovation. Thousands massed the pier and other places of vantage and cheered the athletes to the echo as they sailed, waving their farewells.

Johnny Gibson, 400-meter hurdling star, had his own personal band. It was provided by his home club, the Bloomfield (N. J.) Catholic lyceum in colors of which he won his place on the team.

Charlie Paddock, storm center of an eleven-hour controversy which threatened to disqualify him on grounds of professionalism because of his appearance in a motion picture, went aboard just before sailing time and was given a big hand.

After sixteen years the Indian is again on the Olympic warpath. "Chief" Elkins, the Nebraskan Aborigine, seems slated to pick up the conquering implements in all-round athletic competition, where his red skin predecessor, Jim Thorpe of Carlisle, left off in 1912.

Thorpe, who was an old roommate of mine on the New York Giants, won both the Pentathlon and Decathlon championships in the 1912 Olympics, but the victories are not in the books, for the great Sac and Fox athlete was stripped of his medals and records when it was discovered he had professionalized himself by accepting a few dollars for playing "pro" ball.

Jim never could understand or neither could I how being a rather indifferent pitcher and first baseman in an obscure class D league would make him a professional pentathlon and decathlon champion.

Elkins is the most colorful prospect this year but not the only outstanding star.
Jim Stewart, Southern Californian; Tom Churchill, University of Oklahoma; Vernon Kennedy, Cen. Mo. State Teachers college; Tony Planksky, Ken Doherty, Barney Berlinger and Emmerson Nor-tor are pretty hot prospects.

Officer Tries To Bomb Dread Soviet Cheka

MOSCOW, July 11. (UP)—A Bolshevik soldier and a Russian monarchist officer were killed when monarchists attempted to wreck the building of the dreaded Russian secret service police—the Cheka—July 6. It was announced officially last night.

The monarchist officer, George Harklevitch, reported to have been one of General Wrangle's while Russian lieutenants, was killed when he fled from the scene after hurling a home-made bomb into the building.

Another monarchist—apparently only two were implicated in the bombing—escaped but later was captured in a village near Moscow with the assistance of Peasants, according to the secret service announcement.

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GIANTS BEATEN BACK TO THIRD PLACE TUESDAY

McGraw's Sluggers Meet With Strong Opposition in West

After taking three straight on the chin at Pittsburgh, the Giants moved into the even more dangerous territory of St. Louis yesterday and encountered a storm of runs that gave the league-leading St. Louis Cardinals an easy 5 to 1 victory in the first game of the series.

Their defeat dropped the Giants into third place. Cincinnati moving up into the runner-up position by its 12 to 4 defeat of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Hartnett's single with the bases loaded in the ninth gave the Chicago Cubs a 7 to 6 decision over the Boston Braves in a wild battle at Wrigley field.

The Warner boys drove in the tying and winning runs in the Pittsburgh Pirates 6 to 5 victory over the Phillies.

The Washington Senators moved up to a tie for fourth place in the American league by beating the Cleveland Indians in both ends of a double header, 9 to 5 and 9 to 0. Lou Blue and Frank O'Rourke led the St. Louis Browns to a 4 to 2 triumph over the Boston Red Sox in the opening game of the series.

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Racing Yacht Crew Saved In Nick of Time

NEW YORK, July 11. (UP)—The oil tanker Tuscarora arrived in port here today bringing Captain and Mrs. William Roos of Pelham Manor, New York, and their crew, after rescuing them without injury from the first disaster of the trans-Atlantic yacht race.

The Roos entry in the race was the 50-foot yacht Rofa, sailed by Roos himself and manned by Hugo Schoeller and Charles Townsend of New York; Edwin R. Hotchkiss of Houghton, Mich.; R. Roman of New York, and Mrs. Roos who stood her watch with the others.

After making 807 miles of the more than 3,000 between New York, the starting point of the race, and Spain, the finishing point, the Rofa on the morning of July 6 hit a storm which carried away her sails, snapped her two slender masts, and set the ship hopelessly adrift. That night the Tuscarora was sighted and the crew rescued.

Only a few minutes after Captain Roos and his crew were taken aboard the tanker the Rofa, in tow astern, filled with water and sank.

YOUNG WALTER JOHNSON MAKES FOURTH RESCUE

WASHINGTON, July 11. (UP)—Walter Johnson, a 12-year-old boy, made his fourth rescue in three years here today when he saved a man from drowning in the eastern branch of the Anacostia river. Although no relation to the famous pitcher whose name he bears, his greatest ambition, Walter says, is to be a great pitcher like the former veteran of the Washington Senators.

DASHING CAREER OF SUZANNE LENGLEN IS RAPIDLY NEARING END

PARIS, July 11. (UP)—Far from the enriching guidance of C. C. Pyle, Suzanne Lenglen's professional tennis career is gasping toward an end.

As an amateur, Suzanne undoubtedly was one of the greatest sport attractions of all times and her presence was enough to fill the stands at Wimbledon or draw thousands of sportsmen to Cannes for her "Battle of the Century" with Helen Wills.

As a professional, she is now barely earning enough to keep the wolf pack away from the door of the palatial villa of the Lenglen family on the Riviera at Nice.

Suzanne has had to resort to autographing tennis balls and selling her testimonials to stocking makers, perfumers and sporting goods manufacturers to eke out a living.

A California admirer, Mr. Baldwin, took over her affairs. Baldwin's plan for a tour of Holland during the Olympics failed to materialize for the Dutch tennis federation refused to sanction professional matches on any courts it controlled. Only Germany opened her arms to Suzanne—and she is there now, exhibiting in some obscure town.

Several well-meaning friends of Suzanne has been attempting to convince her there is no future in paid sport. They sought to have her reinstated as an amateur but the French tennis association, remembering what a blow to national sport her jump to professionalism involved, has stood firm on the rule that to become an amateur again she must stop playing professionally for five years.

By that time Suzanne would be 36 years old—and perhaps a bit played out.

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PORTLAND WINS FROM MISSIONS

Jack Knight Allows Four Hits and Three Runs to Californians
