SENATORS AND HOLLYWOOD IN TIE FOR FIRST

First Half Crown of Seals Tilted by Rudie Kallio

Rudie Kallio tilted the first half crown of the Seals a bit farther on one side and kept Sacramento in a first place tie with Hollywood by twirling the Solons to a 2 to 1 win over San Francisco. ONLY MIRACLE WILL DISPLACE LEADING YANKS

Although New York Slows Down, Still in Lead by Ten and Half Games

There is mathematical proof that the New York Yankees have yet to clutch the American league pennant. But alleged contenders in that circuit are coming day by day to the realization that it will take a miracle to head off Babe Ruth and company from their third successive appearance in the world's series. For a month the champions have done little better than break even, yet they lead the procession by ten and a half games. Their closest competitors, the Philadelphia Athletics and the St. Louis Browns have done no better over the same period.

Although the Yanks have won only four more games than they have lost during this period, they have increased their advantage by one percentage point over the second place Athletics and by 30 points over the Browns.
