## TUNNEY COASTS ALONG EASILY FOR BIG BOUT

### Heavyweight Champion Takes Lay-Off Friday, the Thirteenth

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 13. (AP)—Friday the thirteenth was a holiday in Speculator where Gene Tunney is training to defend his heavyweight title against Tom Heoney, the rugged New Zealander on July 26 at the Yankee stadium.

The day's rest, Tunney's handlers believe, will keep the champion, who now weighs 196 1/2, almost his fighting weight, from reaching the peak of condition too early. The day of idleness it was explained, would put about five pounds on him, a margin he will find useful during the 12 days which are yet to come before he defends his crown. Tunney postponed his 19-round session with sparring partners and punching bags until tomorrow. The champion has agreed to take a brisk workout on Sunday while Tex Rickard is here to witness the signing of the New York boxing commission contract for the coming battle. The occasion will be Rickard's first visit to this resort which the champion considers one of the country's most beautiful spots.

## Tom Develops Left Hook For Fight July 26

FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 13. (AP)—Most of Tom Heoney's preparations for his "shot at the heavyweight title on July 26 are based on the development of his southpaw punching apparatus. His right hand, Heoney is pretty well satisfied with. He has used it effectively for years shooting jolting straight punches under the heart. These body punches have been the Anza's best offensive equipment. Now he's developing his left hand so that it won't feel slighted when he takes it along with his right. Into the Yankee stadium ring in two weeks, Heoney has used his left hand to a great extent, of course, in all of his fights in the country, but there's been little or no dynamite in it. Persistent practice in sparring matches here are beginning to show results. The challenger now has a left hook that calls for some respect from the critics as well as his sparring mates. With thunder rolling and heavy storm clouds overhead, Heoney went through his first night workout last night and made such a good showing that the critics were taken somewhat aback.

Jack Quinn, the spit ball hurler on Connie Mack's Athletic machine, is one of baseball's marvels to me. Jack has pitched through almost three decades and shows no signs of wear and tear. They thought he was through almost twenty years ago in the major league and he then went out and pitched for years in the Pacific Coast League, after which he made his second entry into the American League ten years ago.

Eddie Plank, the old Athletic southpaw, was always a marrel to Christy Mathewson. Plank never broke into professional ball till he was thirty years old. Chief Meyers, the Indian catcher, was a marvel for his age. John McGraw of the Giants always claimed Meyers was thirty-five years old when he joined the Giants, and that if he had broken in when he was twenty or twenty-five that he would have been the greatest catcher and hitter of all time. Joe McGinity was another wonder. When he was fifty-five he was a pitcher-manager in the minors. He would walk out in the box and relieve a pitcher without warming up and the first ball he'd throw would be a curve. Alexander is another grand old-timer still fooling the hitters.

## REPORT STATES KRASSIN FINDS ANOTHER PARTY

LONDON, July 13. (AP)—A Reuter's dispatch from Oslo quotes an official telegram agency message from Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, as stating that the ice-breaker Krassia has reached Captain Sora, Italian Alpine leader. No confirmation of this has been received from any other source. Captain Sora left Kings Bay about six weeks ago with the Danish engineer, Varming, and the Dutchman Van Dongen to seek Dr. Finn Malmgren and his two Italian companions Captain Zappi and Mariano.

## LOWER VALLEY OHIO VISITED BY BAD FLOODS

WHEELING, W. Va., July 13. (AP)—Wheeling and towns along the lower Ohio valley today were recovering from the worst storm in 12 years. At least 2,000 men were idle as a result of industrial plants and mines being flooded when small streams overflowed. Moundsville bore the brunt of the storm, the loss there being estimated at \$200,000. Homes were washed from their foundations. Only one loss of life was reported, that of Albert Lawther, a negro, who was drowned near Wellsburg.

## SCANDAL CASE SQUELCHED BY MRS. L. COOGAN

LOS ANGELES, July 13. (UP)—Details of the sensational charges of Mrs. Corabel Bernstein against Mrs. Lillian Coogan, mentioned in a \$750,000 alienation of affections suit, will never be aired, it was intimated tonight when attorneys for both sides said the suit would be withdrawn. Mrs. Bernstein's suit for divorce from Jack Bernstein, naming the mother of Jackie Coogan of film fame as correspondent, however, will go to trial and Bernstein's attorneys will file a cross petition Friday, they said.

## CANDIDATE OF FARMER-LABOR PARTY REFUSES

WASHINGTON, July 13. (AP)—The Farmer-Labor party has chosen a candidate who "does not choose to run." Senator Norris, republican of Nebraska, selected as the standard bearer of that party, declined the nomination late yesterday, but in a statement accompanying his refusal said that his action was not prompted by satisfaction with the two major political parties, or their platforms. "For reasons that I have several times publicly expressed: I cannot accept the nomination for president tendered me yesterday in Chicago," he said.

## WOOL MARKET QUIET IN EAST

### Better Tone Noted However; Caused by Activity in English Mart

BOSTON, July 13. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The week in wool has been extremely quiet, but the tone of the market is better in consequence of the strength at the London sales, which has exceeded expectations. Foreign markets generally are firmer for the same reason. "In the west very little has been done in the new clip wools. "The manufacturing situation still is unsatisfactory, but some improvement is reported in dress goods and the mills in many cases are still busy on old contracts. "Mohair is firm with demand moderate.
