There is just about one chance in a thousand for the average minor leaguer to break into the majors with sufficient force to attract much attention in a single minute.

The managers are but human. They cannot tell at a glance the recruit's ability. Managers make mistakes. The greatest players in the game have been traded, sold or canned. Many capable youngsters have been overlooked.

Very few of you realize the crushing discouragements that come to every ball player. He is just as human as you are, from the \$20,000 a year man to the fellow who plays for \$100 a month in the sticks. He craves money, fame, everything that the normal person craves, and if he is the right sort, he works with desperation to win his way to faster company.

The veterans waver, the new stars flare into incandescent brilliancy, flicker and go out. Upon the heights of popular homage sits the big leaguer, though never very secure on his shaky throne. Down in the dusk is the busher, always driving upward to unseat one of the gods, and rest for his brief moment on the same unstable pedestal.

Few there are strong enough to win; fewer still who climb to the heights of stardom over the prostrate hopes of the veterans who have fallen in the struggle.

What chance has the average player to win the Mecca of his ambition? One in a thousand.

OLYMPIC TEAM HURT AT STORM OF CRITICISM

Steamship President Roosevelt enroute to Amsterdam, July 14. (P)—The series of protests, back home, against the method used in selecting the American Olympic team, finds leaders of Uncle Sam's athletes bound for Olympic conquest at Amsterdam, puzzled and a bit hurt.

This "sniping from the rear" as it was termed by Major General Douglas MacArthur, chairman of the Olympic committee, has not succeeded, however, in breaking down the morale of the athletes.

Replying to critics of the team and the manner of its selection MacArthur said that the team "seems puzzled at the sudden attack which has been made upon it just as it was sailing for foreign shores."

"These fine young Americans," he went on to say, "do not understand this sniping from the rear but as yet it has not affected their splendid morale and they appear serene and determined. They feel intuitively, in spite of criticism, that America's heart still is with each and every one of them."

MacArthur's slap at the team's critics followed announcement by the New York A. C. that it was sponsoring a European trip for five athletes who failed to qualify for the American Olympic squad. The club said it would seek to force their inclusion on the team before the final entries are forwarded to Amsterdam on July 19.

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GIANTS PROVE EASY MARK FOR CARDS, PIRATES

McGraw's Team Knocked Back to Third Place in League

Since John McGraw led his New York Giants across the Alleghenies on the latest western invasion things have been going from bad to worse for him. The first foes that the Giants encountered were the Pittsburgh Pirates, then floundering about in such fashion that it appeared that the only reason they weren't in the National League cellar was because the Phils and Boston Braves were still able to give them lessons in how ball games can be kicked away.

The Giants bowled over the Corsairs in the first game and felt confident that the league lead would be in their possession before long. Here the worm turned. The Pirates played heads up baseball for a change and took the next three battles of the series.

Not so confident McGraw's men took the long trail trip to St. Louis where the four-game series which ended yesterday saw them register only one victory.

As a consequence the Giants fell into third place in the standing, six and a half games back of the onrushing Cardinals and one behind the Cincinnati Reds. The Cards won the last battle of the "crucial series" by getting the jump on their eastern rivals. Vic Aldridge was pounded for three runs in the first inning, five more crossed the platter in the second and the end of the game saw the leaders on the long end of an 11 to 6 score.

McGraw didn't stay around to see the end of the second inning, Dutch Henry relieving him in time to let George Harper, former Giant, hoist a home run with one on in that frame.

JOCKEYS HURT AS HORSES GO DOWN IN RACE

Tex and Gene Talk It Over At Speculator

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 14. (P)—This usually tranquil community where Gene Tunney is training for the defense of his world's heavyweight title against Tom Heeney 12 days hence was all agog today over the first coming of Tex Rickard, promoter of the contest.

The promoter has never been here before and his reception this evening will be either amiable or cool, depending on the location of the fight tickets which he was forced to exchange for the champion.

Tunney ordered about 300 tickets for friends and when Rickard first filled the order, only 20 of the seats were nearer to the ringside than the 30th row. When Gene displayed irritability, Rickard offered to take back the tickets and try to locate Tunney's friends in better spots.

Rickard's real purpose in making his first trip to this Lake Pleasant resort, is to witness the champion's signature to the official contract for the fight.

Tunney refused to listen to suggestions that he postpone his ringwork until Rickard reached the scene but did agree to break his long standing rule against training on Sunday to entertain his guests.

Left Hook To Body Too Much For J. Cooper

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14. (UP)—An onslaught of left hooks to the body and to the head gave Jackie Fields, Los Angeles welterweight, a decision over Joe Cooper of Terre Haute, Indiana, in a 10 round bout here last night.
