



DODGERS UPSET CARDS AS N. Y. DEFEATS REDS

St. Louis Receives Second Successive Setback at Hands of Brooklyn.

Thanks to Del Bissonette and the Brooklyn Dodgers, the National league pennant race has not yet developed into a runaway affair with the St. Louis Cardinals doing the running and the rest of the field panting a city block or two to the rear.

The Dodgers in general and Melen Bissonette in particular, contrived to upset the league leaders yesterday for the second successive day, 3 to 1, and the New York Giants, defeating Cincinnati again moved to within 4 and a half games of the Cards.

Freddy Fitzsimmons won his own game at Cincinnati when he doubled in the eighth inning, scoring Mel Ott with the run that gave the Giants a 2-1 victory over the Reds. Fitz and Red Lucas tangled in a fight hurling fuel in which each team made only six hits.

Taking over the Phils 6 to 3 for their sixth straight victory the Chicago Cubs clung to their third place post two percentage points back of the Giants. Bush was hit hard but lasted until the ninth. With two out and two runs in Percy Jones entered the box to retire the side.

Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig made it 53 home runs for the year as the New York Yankees captured both ends of a double header with the Cleveland Indians, 5 to 3 and 6 to 4. Herb Pennock ran his string of consecutive scoreless innings to 26 in the first encounter and his single in the sixth drove in two of the three Yankee runs. Ruth hammered out his 34th homer of the year in the first inning of the nightcap and Gehrig got his 19th in the fifth. Ruth now stands 15 games, 13 days and four home runs ahead of his 1927 record.

The St. Louis Browns found Washington a stubborn foe but the Senators finally yielded in the 12th inning when the Browns pushed across two runs and won, 6 to 4.

The teletype machine is one of the marvels of a wonderful mechanical age. It is operated by means of electrical impulses sent over the wire from the sending machine to the receiving machines. These pulses are transmitted through perforated tape, as the tape goes through the sending apparatus the pulses put the receiving machine into operation. All the functions of a typewriter, including selection of letters, figures and other characters of the keyboard, shifting of the carriage and feeding of the paper are performed by these machines with accuracy and human intelligence.

The state printer circuits are operated direct from the day and night offices of the Associated Press bureau in the Portland Telegram and Oregonian buildings, respectively.

The Portland newspapers are served by the Oregon state circuit on incoming Oregon news, and contribute Portland news to the circuits.

World and national news received in Portland by the high speed teletype and Morse circuits goes simultaneously to the two Portland papers and to the Portland bureau for distribution to the papers on the state circuits.

The Soviet press not only of the leaving of Malmgren alive but also of General Umberto Nobile's being rescued first and the conduct of the Italia expedition. Captains Mariano and Zappi and Dr. Malmgren started from the scene of the crash of the Italia across the ice for land on May 30. In their march they suffered untold privation. For days they drifted on floating ice. Zappi was quoted as saying that several miles southwest of Brook Island Malmgren was unable to march on. He told his two companions to go ahead and take all the provisions. Zappi's account continued:

"Before leaving, Malmgren asked us to dig a grave in the ice and he lay down. Quietly he stretched out his hand bidding us adieu and, handing up his compass, requested us to give it to his mother."

"We plodded on slowly. In 24 hours we were only 100 meters from Malmgren. We saw Malmgren raise his head. Hoping that driven by hunger he would go on with us, we waited. Realizing this, Malmgren cried:

"Go, go, at the price of my life you'll save all."

"We marched on."

STOCKHOLM, July 16. (AP).—Swedish officials today were considering what steps could be taken toward a formal inquiry into General Umberto Nobile's fatal expedition to the north pole. The newspapers were suggesting a judicial investigation.

The newspaper Dagblad printed a report saying that General Nobile is "in fact the Italian government's prisoner as he is forbidden to leave the base ship Citta Di Milano before he has given the world a clear account of the Italia catastrophe and later events."

Swedish filers in Spitzbergen have been ordered to clear up the mystery of Dr. Finn Malmgren's fate. His Italian companions buried him alive in the ice but the admiral announced it had received no confirmation of the Swedish scientist's death. The search was ordered on the slim chance that he might be alive.

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Pete Latzo Will Try Again To Knock Off Loughran's Crown

WILKES BARRE, Pa., July 16. (AP).—Pete Latzo, pugilist, gets his second shot at the light heavyweight crown in six weeks when he takes on Tommy Loughran, the clever Philadelphia titleholder in a ten round bout here tonight.

Pete is hoping for a little better luck tonight than he had in his first tangle with Loughran at Elberts field, Brooklyn, June 1. The miner entered the ring that night conceding no chance of even making the champion work hard enough to perspire but Pete astounded experts by carrying the fight the whole way. For ten rounds Latzo held an edge on points, but Tommy speeded up in the last five and boxed his way to a close decision.

Fighting before his coal mining friends, Latzo feels it will be another story this time. He has done his best fighting in the hard coal regions. It was at Scranton not far from here, that he relieved Mickey Walker of his welterweight title, only to lose it not long afterward to Joe Dundee of Baltimore. That defeat did not hurt as much as it might for Pete was having trouble making the welterweight limit. He grew so fast in fact that he didn't even pause at the middleweight division, passing right into the 175 pounders.

This psychological advantage of fighting at home will not be the only advantage Pete has. The ten-round distance is another factor that has figured in the betting which finds Loughran on the long end of odds no better than 5 to 4.

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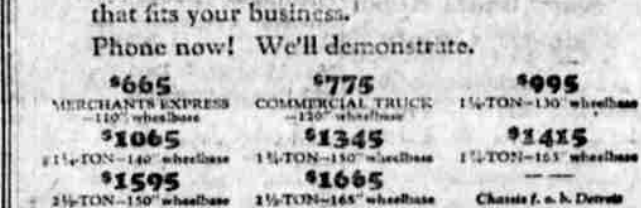
