couper, B. C. much cheaper than the railroads on the United States side of the border transport it to Portland and Seattle from the producing areas of the interior.

Railway attorneys objected to most of the testimony offered by Geary.

Geary was on the stand all forenoon. Each set of figures he introduced was subjected to severe cross-examination by H. J. Hagman, of St. Paul, attorney for the Great Northern railway, who received oral support from other railroad attorneys.

There were more verbal fireworks during the Geary testimony than during all the previous sessions of the hearing in Portland. Time after time B. H. Mayer, Interstate Commerce commissioner, interceded to stop the storm.

When one of Geary's answers did not suit the St. Paul attorney he charged the witness with "trying to sneak out of giving an answer."

Later the Great Northern representative, in answer to a question by the witness, declared he "was not in the habit of getting these things out of the air as is the witness."

After a large number of statistics introduced as exhibits had been given a fine-tooth comb examination, Hagman declared to the witness:

"Not one work in your exhibit shows what it costs to carry a ton of freight on an American railroad and on a Canadian road."

One of Hagman's main objections to the comparison given in the exhibit was that Geary did not mention the large amount of taxes the American railroads have to pay whereas the western section of the Canadian Pacific railroad is tax free.

Asked by the Great Northern attorney if the witness could tell how the American railroads could be operated more efficiently, Geary replied:

"You had better study how the C. P. R. operates its road. That would give you an idea."

of heavy timber in Stanislaus national forest.

A fire 12 miles north of San Diego burned 4000 acres, some of it valuable grazing land.

In Fraser mountain park a fire destroyed nearly 2000 acres of timber before it was controlled. Gasoline spilled by campers started the blaze.

A force of 150 men were fighting a blaze in Big Tujunga canyon, north of Pasadena.

A dozen ranches near Academy, in the Fresno district, were swept by flames which started at a ranch house, which was destroyed. Some 20,000 acres of brush and grazing land were burned.

The Portland firm of Simonson and Heft holds the contract for the re-surfacing of the Klamath Falls-Keno section of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, an 11 mile project entailing a cost of \$50,000. The project is one third completed.

Although John Hampshire, Grants Pass, was the successful bidder for the re-surfacing of 18.7 miles of The Dalles-California highway from Klamath Falls to Merrill, the work is being done by the sub-contractor, the W. D. Miller Construction company.
