PIRATES, CUBS EACH WIN LAST 8 BALL GAMES

Sensational Sports Keep
Up Interest in Na-
tional League

Sensational sports by the Cubs and Pirates have added spice to the National League pennant race just when it began to appear as though the St. Louis Cardinals were going to make it a one-club affair somewhat similar to the situation in the American league where the New York Yankees have distanced the field.

The Cubs and Pirates each recorded their eighth successive victory yesterday, with the Phils and the Boston Braves as their victims.

Joe McCarthy's Chicago hopefuls upset the Phils, 4 to 3, only because Clyde Beck, usually weak with the stick, clubbed a home run with the bases filled in the fifth.

The Pirates needed to be on their toes the whole way against the Braves before they eked out a 7 to 6 decision.

Meanwhile the Cardinals gained an even break with the Brooklyn Dodgers by taking the last game of a four game series, 7 to 1. Dazzy Vance was removed from the box after the Cards had scored five runs on nine hits in the first five innings. Jess Haines pitched a strong game for the league leaders whose margin over their closest rivals, the Cubs, now stands at four games.

Southpaw Bill Walker was knocked out of the box in the first inning as the Cincinnati Reds salvaged one game out of the series with the New York Giants, 5 to 4.

The Boston Red Sox came out of a slump that had carried them into the American league cellar by stopping the Chicago White Sox's streak, 9 to 6.

Detroit fell into the last place spot by bowing before the fast-ball prowess of Bob Grove, Athletics southpaw ace, who turned in an easy 6 to 2 triumph. Grove fanned eight tigers while Ty Cobb, playing against his old teammates, got two singles, a double, drew a pass and scored three runs.

Al Shealy pitched the New York Yankees to their fifth straight victory over the Cleveland Indians, 4 to 2, and contributed a home run to his own cause.

The St. Louis Browns swept the series with Washington when Stewart held the Senators to five hits and turned in a shutout, 5 to 0.

GENE REACHES TRAINING EDGE

Tunney Trains Down to
190½ Pounds, and Is
Hitting Hard

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 18. (AP).—If Gene Tunney is visited today by Commander Richard E. Byrd, trans-Atlantic and polar flyer, the heavyweight champion will take a workout to fit himself for the defense of his title against the New Zealander. Therefore he cannot afford to take off any more poundage in the training ring, but he is willing to risk this loss to entertain Commander Byrd, one of his intimate friends.

Another guest expected today was James J. Corbett, former heavyweight champion, who sent word that he was coming up to this Adirondack beauty spot to look over the current ruler of Pistians.

Tunney today was dangerously near the fighting edge and his handlers intended to give him just enough work to keep him from going stale. He is stronger than he has ever been in his career and his punching, according to his sparring partners, has been speedier and more vicious than ever before.

Both Harold Mays and Billy Vidabek, who swap blows with the champion during the training bouts, have worked with him ever since he became prominent in the heavyweight ranks.

Tunney was greatly annoyed by a report, accredited to Tex Rickard, promoter of the titular bout, that he intended to retire from the ring after his fight with Heenev.

"I have never discussed that subject with Rickard," Tunney said.

When Rickard visited Tunney over the week end, the promoter frankly admitted that he hoped the challenger would be the victor. Rickard figures that if Heenev wins, he can immediately match the New Zealander for a battle with Jack Dempsey in September and, if he overcame the man Tunney twice defeated,

Mrs. Matson said she had never seen the men before. Her only description was that they were "dark and young looking men." She said that she had fought desperately to get away from the two who attacked her in the house.

Marks on the ground, from the door to the gate, where the car stood, gave evidence of a terrific struggle. She was found at 2 o'clock, two and one half hours after the men had first appeared at the house.

ALBANY, Ore., July 18. (AP).—District Attorney L. G. Lewelling went to Halsey this morning to investigate further the kidnapping story told by Mrs. John Matson, who was found in a dazed condition five miles south of Halsey yesterday afternoon, lying in the rear seat of her husband's automobile.

Mrs. Matson was examined by a physician at Halsey who said she showed evidence of having been given a drug, and that she bore bruises indicating an assault. She said four men had come to her home at noon asking permission to use her telephone. When she replied that she had no phone, Mrs. Matson said, the men seized her and placed her in a car. She was unable to tell more of the affair. The woman's story is disconnected District Attorney Lewelling said, and requires further explanation.

A strange rumor that an unknown young hero had the championship sewed up sped like wildfire over the Olympia Fields course during the close of the National Open Golf Tournament. Hagen's and Jones' gallery of thousands melted away and raced to watch young Roland Hancock of Wilmington, N. C., play his last two holes. Hancock, who had been trucking around the course for three days with only his partner, Willie Hunter, their caddies and the score keeper, as his gallery, suddenly found himself the magnet of a wild, unmanageable gallery of 10,000 pop-eyed thrill chasers. He needed only to play the last two holes in 5's, one over par, to win the greatest honor in golf with its reward of glory and gold. The rest of the story is golf tragedy.

BEATTY DEPUTY RESIGNS POST

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HEENEY CRANKY AND JUMPY AS CONTEST NEARS

Tom Will Be Paced by
Fast Welterweights and
Light Heavies

FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 18. (AP).—With new sparring mates in camp and others on the way, the process of developing Tom Heenev's speed started today. From now on Heenev's trainers plan to send him against lighter, faster boxers, ranging from welterweights to light heavies.

Mickey Walker, world's middleweight title holder, lives in the nearby village of Rumson and has promised to aid the challenger in return for the courtesy "Squire" John Mortimer displayed in him while he was in England for his fight with Tommy Milligan.

Heenev starts his intensive training period showing traces of nervousness and irritability, signs accepted by the old timers as unfailing evidence that he is getting on edge. Little things are beginning to upset him. Before starting work yesterday, he was beset by photographers and while responding to their demands for poses he displayed evidences of crankiness that gave much satisfaction to his trainer, Jimmy Hennessey.

The challenger faced two new sparring partners yesterday and while they hit the old hard rock with everything they had, he kept charging in until he got within range and then let punches fly from all sides. The new mates were named J. Braddock, a 170 pounder, from Jersey City, and James J. Lawless, weighing 190 pounds and hailing from Harrison, N. J. As Heenev is preparing to fight a gentleman named James J. Tunney, nicknamed Gene, the new additions seemed to be quite in style.

Both Braddock and Lawless had no apparent trouble in hitting Heenev but he never broke ground, never once changed his charging pace through the barrage they laid down all around him. Getting in close, he whaled away with his powerful arms, once jarring Braddock with a left hook to the body and a short right cross to the chin.

Braddock, rated as a hard puncher, said it was almost impossible to slow Heenev up.

"He comes tearing in all the time," Braddock said. "Hitting

him is like taking a sock at the side of a building. I can understand now why he's never been knocked off his feet."

Heenev weighed 205 pounds when he started work yesterday.

McVEY BEATEN IN TEN ROUNDS BY K. KAPLAN

NEW YORK, July 18. (UP).—K. O. Kaplan won the decision over Jack McVey in ten rounds of savage fighting at the Queensboro stadium last night. Kaplan weighed 160 and McVey 157 3/4. Kaplan will be matched with George Courtney, the winner to meet Mickey Walker for the middleweight title.
