MORGAN SAVES TITLE IN GORY 15 ROUND BOUT

Slim, Frail Youth From Seattle Just Barely Noses Out Victor

NEW YORK, July 19. (AP).—Cannonball Eddie Martin, one-time king of the bantamweights today had nothing but deep and lasting scars along with the knowledge that Tod Morgan too was covered with lumps to show for his second assault on the Junior Lightweight title.

The slim, frail-appearing kid from Seattle, who looked as though he might break in half under Martin's vicious body thumping, came through a storm of terrific punishment last night to save the crown in a fifteen round engagement that drew 20,000 spectators to Ebbets field and \$29,000.

Although Morgan, according to the Associated Press score sheet, won eight of the fifteen rounds while Martin gained but four with three even, the battle was close all the way with shades alone deciding many of the decisions. Only in the thirteenth round was there danger of a knockout and then it was Morgan, the champion, who reeled around the ring, battered from pillar to post by the challenger's lunging, driving attack.

The battle was gory enough to rival Gene Tunney's famous bleeding session with Harry Greb several years ago. In the very first round, a butt opened a rash over Morgan's left eye, while Tod slashed Martin's right cheek open in the third, Morgan added a dripping nose to the spectacle in the sixth and in the tenth the challenger's right eye brow was cut to the bone. Both fighters were stained crimson to the waist.

Martin smashed a left hook to the champion's right eye in the fifth round and before the battle was over the optic was closed and puffed out inches from the rest of his face.

Morgan's cleaner punching, better boxing ability, and ring generalship gave him an edge in the first three rounds. Martin's aggressiveness and constant plunging to close quarters won him the fourth, fifth and sixth, while the champion took the rest with the exception of the thirteenth—Martin's best session—and the eighth, eleventh and fourteenth, which were even.

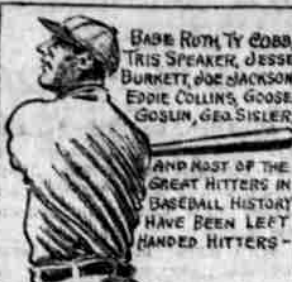

It has always been a matter of much curiosity to me just why there are not as many or more great left-handed golfers than the ones who swing from the orthodox side.

Most of the great modern sluggers are left-handed hitters and the greatest "place biter" I them all, Willie Keeler, was a "southpaw" hitter.

In tennis, ice hockey, shot putting, boxing and football there have been many outstanding stars who did their "stuff" left-handed. Parisien, the Notre Dame star, was one of the greatest throwers of forward passes and he was ambidextrous. The only ambidextrous golfer I ever knew was pitcher Carl Mays, of the Cincinnati Reds. Mays, who is a right-handed pitcher, uses right-handed wood and iron clubs, but puts left-handed.

Jack Hutchinson told me the greatest left-handed golfer he ever saw was Davy Watts, who was the professional champion of Scotland before the world war in which he lost his life.

If any of the readers can advance any logical reason for the absence of great left-handed golfers in the big tournaments like the National Open, the Western Open and the National Amateur, I will be glad to use them.

HOMER OF BABE BEATS CHICAGO IN 9TH INNING

White Sox Cheated Out of Game by Great Yankee Slugger

The rise of the Chicago White Sox to a place among the elite has developed complications of a social nature for Prof. Russell (Lena) Blackburne. "How to behave when Babe Ruth is at bat" henceforth will be a much more vital question to the ambitious young men of Prof. Blackburne than the conduct expected, say, in helping a lady into a patrol wagon, or other conveyance.

Some doubt regarding the dues of Mr. Ruth could be noticed among the White Sox in the ninth inning at the Yankee Stadium yesterday. The Babe swished a bat at Ted Lyons with perfect ease. Two Yankees were out, Combs and Koenig were on base, and the White Sox led by 8 to 6. Lena was firm in his refusal to pass the winning run to first base, with the result that the Babe combed his thirty-sixth home run into the right field bleachers to nose out the Chicagoans by 9 to 8.

The Cleveland Indians broke out of their slump—if losing to the Yankees when they are interested may be construed as a slump—by shading the Red Sox in ten innings at Boston, 6 to 5. The Athletics took another from the Tigers in Philadelphia, 5 to 1. The other American league teams were idle.

The Pirates would be champions of the world if the other fifteen teams were the Phillies and the Braves. The Buccaneers made it nine straight this season by slugging the Bostonese, 16 to 3, yesterday as a few terrified witnesses stood by powerless to halt the brutality. Burleigh Grimes won his fifteenth victory. Viv Aldridge, just for a comparison, is not even in the National league records.

The Reds raised their stock somewhat by taking two decisions from the Robins, 11 to 10 and 2 to 1, while other first division teams remained idle. It was not reported, however, that the Cardinals had any fewer than their customary eight hours of sleep.

TUNNEY SLOWS DOWN TRAINING AS BOUT NEARS

Gene Dangerously Near Fighting Weight for Big Bout

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 19. (AP).—Dangerously near fighting weight, Gene Tunney, who will risk his world's heavyweight title against Tom Heeney, the powerful New Zealand blacksmith, just a week hence, was given a holiday today.

The champion was down to 190 pounds, almost the weight he will carry when he enters the ring against Heeney, and from now on his days of strenuous preparation are few. He will probably work hard tomorrow and again next Monday.

During the next 24 hours, Tunney will decide whether he will fly to New York with Commander Richard Byrd, on the day of the titular fight, or travel by motor. If he chooses a motor he will stop to visit James J. Corbett, former heavyweight champion, at Wappingers Falls, N. Y.

Tunney was given a vivid picture of air travel yesterday when a party of friends met with a mishap while returning to New York after making a flight here to watch him work out.
