Mrs. Bruce Dennis is visiting in Portland with friends.

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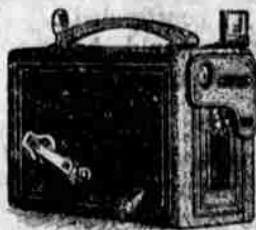
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Honored at Veterans Meeting—
