ry, wealthy banker, funeral services for whom will be held this afternoon at the University Chapel with only immediate friends attending.

Before the Hoover special arrived from the national capital, via the summer white house at Cedar Island lodge in the northern Wisconsin hills, the University authorities requested the townfolks to remain at home both during the arrival of the party and the funeral services.

As his train crossed into California, Mr. Hoover sent a message to the people of his state, saying that he returned "with a deep sense of responsibility that I may add to her distinction in that task for which she has presented me to the nation."

Six days out of Washington, the special train carrying the Hoover party was routed directly to the candidate's old home, 33 miles south of San Francisco.

This prevented the candidate's visiting the San Francisco bay cities, where celebrations in his honor had been planned. Celebrations will be held later, however, and there will also be one at Los Angeles as the candidate

swings back again into the middle West and East.

While the special was crossing the trackless wastes of the Nevada desert late yesterday and last night, Mr. Hoover received encouraging reports from Republican leaders of Nevada and neighboring states. These were given by Governor Balfour, of Nevada, and N. H. Getchell, of Battle Mountain, wealthy miner and banker, and Republican state chairman for Nevada, and others.

Getchell declared there was no doubt about Nevada voting Republican in November.

"This is the first time in history that we have had the opportunity and the privilege of voting for a western man for the presidency," he said. "We know that Mr. Hoover knows our problems because he has slept under the same brush like the rest of us. He is a westerner and has our point of view."
