AUTHOR TELLS OF YOUNG GIRL (Continued from page 1) men told me today of her death.

NEW YORK, July 21. (AP)—Dependency over her failure at a literary career was the motive accepted by police today for the apparent suicide of Miss Virginia Drew, literary protégée of Maxwell Bodenheim, poet and author. Miss Drew's body was found floating in the Hudson river Thursday afternoon. She was last seen leaving Bodenheim's apartment early Monday.

The girl's relatives, however, are unsatisfied with the police theory and the explanation advanced by an artist friend that Miss Drew killed herself in carrying out a suicide pact with a "prominent novelist" who believed with her in reincarnation. They believe she was thrown into the river to drown.

The friend, Miss Caroline Novotny, told police Miss Drew telephoned her last week and said that the prominent novelist, whose name she did not divulge, had "cut her to the heart" with his criticism of her work. "Miss Drew then told me," Miss Novotny said, "that he, too, was a believer in reincarnation and that they had made a suicide pact."

RELEASE JOHN MEEK SUSPECT (Continued from page One) formed that the man probably was the Klamath Falls fugitive. Meek has been sought since last December when Johnnie Ansil was slain in a store robbery.

Ansil, an old and trusted employe of the Klamath Gun Store, was murdered about 7 a. m. on the morning of the last day of 1927. His body was discovered a half hour later by a customer.

The gun from which the fatal bullet emitted, was of a queer type, and it was this clue which finally led officials to suspect Meek, a recluse and logger residing near Odessa on upper Klamath lake. Meek apparently learned that officers were after him for on an instant's notice he deserted his lonely cabin and fled to the south in a small car.

At Redding he left his machine in a garage—where it still remains—and with the remark that he was going to catch a south-bound train, left the garage.

That was the last seen of the suspected man. Numerous tips have been run down but nothing definite has resulted. One such chase was concentrated in northern California, where the man was believed to be hiding.
