OLYMPIC TEAMS WORKOUT TODAY

AMSTERDAM, July 23, (AP)—The American Olympic teams today began their final week of training in the same time weather which has greeted them since the President Roosevelt left America nearly two weeks ago.

Double workouts daily will be held until mid-week when the track and field men who compete next week will taper off.

The marathon squad was out early today for their 18 mile jog along the flat course they will follow in actual competition against the world's best distance runners during the games. Jole Ray, the converted miller, appeared particularly strong. The confident Chicagoan is up to his natural weight and is in high spirits.

The rowers were ready for a big day of speed tests at Sloten. Major General Douglas MacArthur of Baltimore, president of the American Olympic committee, yesterday traversed the crew course and returned to the Roosevelt enthusiastic about it and excited as a boy over the showing of the University of California eight.

"It's the finest crew I've ever seen in the world," he exclaimed. "Every man is magnificent in power and steadiness."

CHICAGO WHITE SOX WIN FROM N. Y. YANKEES

Eight Game Winning Streak Broken Up by "Red" Faber

It's the pitchers with baseball brains that give the Yankees the most trouble—veterans like, old Jack Quinn, "Sad Sam" Jones, George Uhlen, and Urban Faber, whose right arm has been puzzling American league swamis for 15 years.

Urban's fast one may have lost most of its zip and that curve may not be what it was ten years ago but backed by a brain that tells him where to put each ball and the control to obey his brain's directions, "Red" is doing very well indeed, thank you.

After the Yankees had taken over the Sox in the first three games of the current series, Faber yesterday took up the task of stopping the champions and saving something out of the wreckage.

He was quite equal to the emergency. The Yankees hit him hard and often but the veteran's courage and brain, as well as his bat, carried the Sox through to a 6 to 4 victory. Incidentally the champions saw an eight game winning streak snapped. As usual, "Red" pitched skillfully and successfully to Babe Ruth who made four official trips to the plate and batted precisely nothing flat.

To add insult to injury, it was a single by Faber that drove in the winning runs in the eighth.

After a disastrous visit to Philadelphia, the third-place St. Louis Browns got out of their slump with an 8 to 5 win over the Cleveland Indians.

Washington went into fifth place, two games back of the White Sox, by taking Detroit's measure, 3 to 2. Braxton pitched steady ball for the Senators, while Holloway was ineffective.

In the National League the Chicago Cubs strengthened their hold on second place when Charlie Root held the Giants to four hits and won, 4 to 2. The Cubs failed to gain any ground on the Cardinals, however, for the Phillies reverted to type and bowed to the league leaders, 8 to 7.

Root, showing further return to the form that made him the outstanding pitcher of the league last season, had the Giants shut out until the eighth when Melvin Ott, the "boy wonder" hit a home run. More than 50,000 saw the game.

Doubles by Douthitt and Holm in the ninth enabled the Cards to nose out the Phillies. Hurst's thirteenth homer of the year in the first half of the same inning tied the score.

For the third straight time, the Cincinnati Reds trimmed the Boston Braves by one run. The score this time was 5 to 4. Denning gave the Reds the game. Lulaway's wildness in the eighth inning was in control of the Braves' batsmen after he was slugged for three runs in the first inning.

The Pittsburgh Pirates and Brooklyn Dodgers confirmed their bitter battle for fifth place now held by the Dodgers. They split even in a double bill at Brooklyn yesterday.

Daddy Vance was in form in the first game, allowing the Corsairs only four hits and fanning eight men. The Dodgers carrying off a 5 to 6 decision, Burleigh Grimes pitched great ball for the Pirates but he met his match in the dazler, Remy Kremer, enabled the Pirates to make it an even break when he outpitched five Robin pitchers and won 6 to 5 in the nightcap.

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COMMISSIONERS VISIT IN THIS CITY SATURDAY

Klamath Falls was honored Saturday evening with a party of high officials of the nation and state.

In the party were B. H. Meyer, interstate commerce commissioner; Arthur R. Mackay and George R. Hall, examiners for the commission; J. J. Murphy, chairman of the railroad commission of South Dakota, also chairman of the co-operative committee associated with the interstate commerce commission under the Hoke Smith government rate investigation; James P. Neal, member of the Washington state department of public works and also a member of the co-operative commission; A. B. Enoch, general counsel for the Rock Island railroad and chairman of the legal committee of western trunk lines and southern railroads; R. J. Hagman, assistant general counsel for the Great Northern railroad and representing the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Milwaukee lines in the investigation; Public Service Commissioner L. E. Bean and Commissioner Edward Ostrander of the Oregon public service commission.

In the party also were Mrs. J. J. Murphy, Mrs. James P. Neal and Mrs. L. E. Bean, whose husbands were officials named above.

Not exactly on a junketing trip but out to see the state of Oregon in a hurry, was the mission of the visitors. They came from Portland, where the commissioners and examiners are holding a hearing on wheat freight rates in Oregon and other Pacific coast states. After several weeks of brain fog from listening to figures and reading the tariff sheets, members of the party started for Klamath Falls to relax and enjoy the country.

Given Pleasant Banquet.
Business men comprising the chamber of commerce gave a banquet for the visitors at the Pelican Grille in the evening. H. D. Mortensen, owner of Pelican Bay Lumber company and one of the best-known business men on the Pacific coast, acted as toastmaster. With his easy, graceful manner he made the occasion one of exceptional pleasure, with guests and home folk mingling together.

Commissioner L. E. Bean, known to people here as "Louie," for he once was a buckaroo in the Klamath Basin, was the first speaker. He told of the party waiting to see Oregon and when he started them out he could think of no place more interesting than Klamath Falls and Crater Lake. Louie waxed eloquent on the gifts of nature which are within Oregon's borders. He said this was an occasion when business was not to be mentioned but that the visitors would like to know something about Klamath.

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for the Rock Island railroad, found that he was not among strangers. In his college days he was a classmate of both C. C. McCulloch and Fred Fleet of this city.

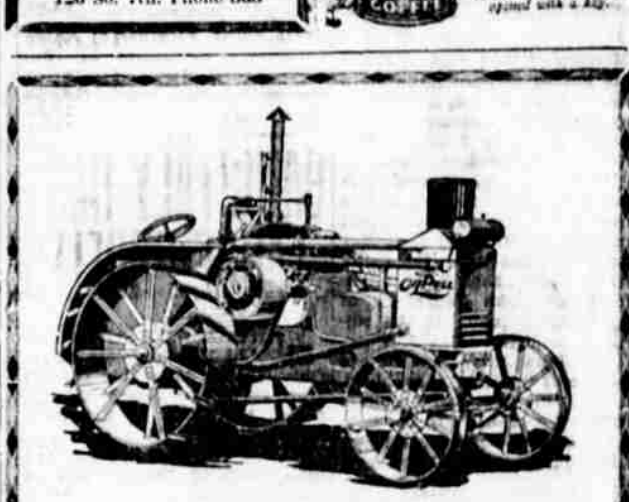
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
