CHICAGO GROWING SERIOUS

stood respectfully to one side, ready to administer to the fallen gallant.

The battle is said to have out-ranked anything of its kind for accuracy. One of the combatants is said to have stuck the point of his weapon into the base of the ear light and his antagonist almost stabbed himself with his own weapon. The air was punched full of holes and the swishings of the deadly rapier could be heard a block away.

Then came the climax of the battle. The doctor got in the way of one of the thrusts, the point of the rapier entering his arm below the elbow. This, it is reported, resulted in a complete reunion of the ties of friendship which previously had existed between the antagonists, both expressing deep satisfaction at having drawn blood without harming each other.

The doctor is said to have treated his wound at his home and today has it carefully concealed beneath his coat sleeve. The two antagonists are said to have taken the ancient weapons back to the doctor's study and to have departed together on a fishing trip.

The Telegram was unable to give the names.

STRAY BULLET WOUNDS SAILOR

CHEE FO O, Shantung, China, July 23, (AP)—The recently hoisted sun banner of the Chinese Nationalists was hauled down here today and replaced by the five-barred flag of North China. The nationalist military commander took refuge aboard a British vessel bound for Shanghai. His soldiers have been disarmed.

These developments came after severe fighting which started at midnight between the Nationalists and five thousand soldiers who had served under Chang Tsun-chang, military governor of Shantung. The Tsun Changites had been recently incorporated into the Nationalist army but they renounced their new allegiance and gained control of the city.

While fighting was in progress foreign warships landed patrols and one American sailor was wounded in the hand by a stray bullet.

and that in time northwestern exporters will have to reach east into the Mississippi valley for grain. Then the commission will be asked to make a rail rate to haul wheat here so the local dealers can compete with the shippers of the Atlantic and Gulf states.

The witness said there has been no difference in buying grain south of the Snake river, since a rate differential in favor of Portland, went into effect. He said the farmers always have shopped around with their wheat to get the best possible price.

"There is keen competition in buying wheat, and it would not be any keener if another city entered the market on a parity with Portland," Martin said.

Asked if he had wheat to sell and wished to haul it to a warehouse, if he would not choose one served by two railroads instead of one, Martin said that if the two roads offered the same price he would. He stated that where railroad rates are equal wheat moves to the highest priced markets.

Martin thought it would be desirable to have more wheat milled in the northwest so as to have the mill products for this market.

THEATER HELD UP BY BANDIT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23, (A. P.)—Police were without a clue today in their search for a tall, roughly dressed man who held up the manager's office of the Portland Theater and escaped with \$1,000 in currency, which he forced the cashier to turn over. While the patrons of the theater were enjoying a film drama, a real life play was being enacted behind their backs.

The robber held up Harry Wareham, house manager, Robert B. Lair, theater manager, and Steve E. Cheever, treasurer, and walked out of the building with the currency, leaving \$542 in silver on a table.

The resignation, it is understood, becomes effective sometime next month.
