YANKEES LOSE BY BIG SCORE

League Leaders Now Only Six and Half Games Ahead

Something has struck the proud Yankee craft, bow, stern and amidship. She's still afloat but leaking badly and may go down at any minute.

A month ago the champions were leading the American league procession by more than a dozen games. Today that lead had dwindled to six and a half games. Taking heart at this unexpected collapse upon the part of the haughty New Yorkers, Connie Mack has pushed his Philadelphia Athletics along at a whirlwind pace and again has hopes of realizing his long-deferred ambition of piloting another league pennant winner.

At Cleveland yesterday, before 11,000 fans, the largest crowd of the season there, the Yankees suffered the most humiliating defeat they have taken since 1925 when they ended the season in seventh place. They were annihilated by the Cleveland Indians, 24 to 6, in the wildest major league game of the year.

The Indians started out with eight runs in the first inning, decided that wouldn't be enough and scored nine more in the second.

One run as the best the Indians could do in the third and they waited until the sixth inning to score the last six.

The pitching victims were, in order, George Pipgras, Willy Moore, Myles Thomas, Henry Johnson and Archie Campbell.

While all this was going on, the Athletics were chalking up another win at St. Louis, taking over the Browns for the seventh straight time, 8 to 3.

Jimmy Fox pounded a homer, a double and single and drove in four runs.

After losing six in a row, the Boston Red Sox beat the Detroit Tigers 5 to 2.

After losing their seventh straight contest in the first game, the Chicago White Sox came back to beat the Washington Senators in the last half of a double bill. Ted Lyons was ineffective in the opener and the Senators pounded out an 8 to 3 victory. Atkins was in form in the nightcap and the Sox ended their long string of reverses with a 5 to 1 triumph.

In the National league, the Cincinnati Reds strengthened their hold on second place by turning back the Brooklyn Dodgers, 6 to 5.

The New York Giants and Chicago Cubs fought each other to a standstill in a double bill at the Polo Grounds. The Giants took the first game, 4 to 3 in ten innings. Larry Benton gaining his 17th victory of the year. Guy Bush outpitched Viv Aldridge in the nightcap and the Cubs won 3 to 1.

BEND EAGLES DEFEAT ALBANY

Hooks and Slides

SO LONG, MR. BUSH!

Even the customers in Pittsburgh are willing to admit now that there is more than a slight possibility that the Pirates will take their orders from a new field boss next season.

Donie Bush, who led the team into the disastrous world series last fall, is said to have admitted to friends that his job is gone, but that he will not give up, and the Dreyfuss firm will have to fire him.

Earlier reports of dissension on the club were denied vigorously in Pittsburgh, but now it is admitted that one or two of the more important players on the club do not get on with their boss and that their grievances are justified.

The manager who fails to deliver with a team such as the Pirates have must expect criticism to make many glaring mistakes, but Bush had the misfortune in judgment that convinced his players and the customers that he couldn't have won with the team even if the players had all been able to play their best all season.

LOOK UNDER THE HOOD

Injuries and illness made the work hard for Bush this year, of course, but there must be something structurally wrong with a ball club that has made so little out of such good prospects for a number of years. Bill McKelchie couldn't do much with the club, but he is doing a fine job with the Cardinals and there is said to be more office interference in St. Louis than there was in Pittsburgh.

Mild-mannered players have been unable to get along in Pittsburgh and delivered elsewhere. So there must be something wrong inside the club.

When a very good ball club can't win games, the first suspicion is that there is a little heart lacking in vital parts. For years the Pirates were suspected of being timid and the Athletics this year are accused of dogging it, although no other ball club could keep much closer to the Yankees than the Athletics have done.

When there are positive evidences of real fighting spirit in good material and the manager isn't a bushier, the next suspicion is of office interference.

Until Bucky Harris took the Washington club and made something of it, it was a common belief that Clarke Griffith interfered too much with the management. Branch Rickey's interference stared Hornsby's trouble with the Cardinals and earlier in the season kidding Bill McKelchie and asking him where the manager was. Business office intrusion is said to have caused dissension among the New York Giants and it is charged openly in Chicago that Harry Grabner is destroying the White Sox. The Reds also had a board of directors management for years.

But as long as they continue under the present ownership they will never hear that the managers of the New York Yankees

Nine-tenths of the baseballs that Ruth autographs for his thousands of admirers and worshippers are purchased by the fans themselves and brought to Babe for his all important signature.

For this reason and numerous others that I haven't room for here, I maintain that he is the most underpaid man in baseball today.

FRANCE KEEPS TENNIS TITLE

Cochet Defeats "Big Bill" to Retain Davis Cup

ROLAND GARRIOS STADIUM, Auteuil, France, July 30. (AP)—America's campaign to recapture the Davis Cup from the French failed today when Henri Cochet defeated William T. Tilden in the deciding match of the series in straight sets by scores of 9-7, 8-6, 6-4.

This gave the French three of the four matches played.

The French kept the cup as a result of singles victories for Cochet over both Hennessey and Tilden and Frank Hunter.

Cochet thus was the hero of the challenge round, with a perfect record of three victories.

One more match of the challenge round series remains, pitting Rene Lacoste against John Hennessey, but it will be nothing more than an exhibition as everything hung upon the outcome of the Tilden-Cochet match.

Big Bill put up a gallant fight against his brilliant little French opponent, but showed the effects of the losing five set doubles match in which he participated yesterday.

Cochet was at his whirlwind best today and gave Big Bill the worst beating he ever received in Davis Cup play. Never before had Tilden been trimmed in straight sets in a challenge round for the trophy.

Realizing that his best chance lay in wearing down the American, the canny young player from Lyons kept him on the run constantly, deceiving the sets and stretching them out interminably. Tilden made a brave attempt to win the second set and seven times needed only one point to gain it and square the match, but each time failed as Cochet steadily overhauled him.

The third set saw Tilden again battling fiercely, this time in the hope of forcing the match to four sets which would have given him the intermission at the end of the third set in which to rest.

Cochet had other plans, however, and finished him off before the American could gain the coveted breathing space.

SALEM DEFEATS EUGENE TEAM
