

FIND BODY OF MURDERED BOY

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 31.—The body of Frank Plummer, 20, missing from Portland since last Friday, was found in brush about a mile west of Cascade Locks today, with a bullet wound through the head.

The position of the body, and a small amount of blood on leaves and brush nearby, caused officers who found the body to believe that he had been murdered.

The body was found about a mile west of the spot where the boy's abandoned automobile was found yesterday near Cascade Locks. Two deputy sheriffs, Glenn Sloan and J. H. Sheldrake of Hood River county, and a party of Crag Rats, including H. J. Blackburn and L. M. Baldwin, found the body this morning. It was inside the Multnomah county line and officers of that county were notified.

The small car in which young Plummer had left home last Friday, was found in bushes just off the Columbia river highway, near Cascade Locks yesterday, stripped of its tires and rims. An old black sweater and a camera were found in the car. Officers had been on the lookout for young Plummer since Sunday when parents of the boy enlisted aid in locating him. The boy was on vacation and went on a trip, and when he failed to return Sunday his parents became alarmed, fearing he had met with an accident. Radio descriptions were broadcast from Portland Sunday night. The first trace of the boy came yesterday when his car was found. No one in this vicinity had been found today who had seen the boy.

SUSPECT FOUND SHOT TO DEATH

CHICAGO, July 31. (AP)—Henny Zion, indicted by the special election frauds grand jury on nine separate counts for complicity in the slaying of Octavious Granady, 20th ward candidate for committeeman, was found shot to death today in an alley back of a west side saloon. Zion, found partly buried under a pile of refuse, had been shot four times, and police said the shooting apparently had taken place in the saloon, the slayers dragging Zion out to the alley, where an ice man found his body.

The indictments against Zion were returned by the June special grand jury, charging him with taking part in the slaying of Granady and other election day disorders.

The special investigators in charge of the grand jury said they had received positive evidence that Zion was in the automobile in which rode the slayers of Granady, who was shot to death in his automobile.

Zion had obtained his release under the indictments by providing bonds of almost \$100,000. His identity was established by finger prints at the bureau of identification.

Police said they found a few blood-stained coins and a bloody rag in the saloon, indicating the slaying had taken place there.

Special investigators for the grand jury said it appeared Zion had been killed to prevent him from talking after chief investigator John Sieke had described Zion as a man with a "gabby tongue."

Zion was considered a henchman of Morris Eller whose son, Judge Emmanuel Eller, reduced Zion's bonds to bring about his release.

BODIES FOUND

GUERNSEY, Wyo., July 31. (AP)—The charred remains of two men who were burned to death in a freight train wreck near here Sunday were found last night. Twenty-seven cars, most of them loaded with gasoline or crude oil, left the track and burned. The loss was placed at \$55,000.

He said there was much to be explained.

"There was a peck-leg man," the lieutenant said, "old, like Kessler, who lived with him and Claudia until a few months ago. The peck-leg man disappeared, vanishing as completely as though he had never existed."

Kessler today lay in a hospital cot, suffering from wounds inflicted when he was beaten by two men and a woman Saturday. They had sought to compel him to reveal the hiding place of a board they insisted existed. When he reiterated that he was poor, they attacked him.

Twenty-six years ago Kessler was granted a permit to build a hut on land which is now part of Cook county's forest preserve. He had come here from Basle, Switzerland, after failing to win ordination as a priest. Within the hut he erected an altar, and surrounded himself with icons, religious books and paintings.

Police heard that Kessler was religious adviser to a small group who used his hermitage as a place of worship. They believe that the attempted robbery, was instigated by the woman, possibly one of the worshippers, who told the men she had seen Kessler receive sums of money from his followers.

Kessler said his cousin died from lack of proper medical attention, he lacking funds to pay a doctor and she refusing his plea that she go to the county hospital.

A man and woman were under arrest—Michael Ott and Mrs. Ellen Natterville. Police said Mrs. Natterville admitted being implicated in the assault on Kessler. She named James Donovan, who was being sought today, as the other man.

MILL WORKERS STILL DEFIANT

Still defiant, as they were when they picketed en masse at mill gates last night contrary to police wishes. The strikers, 82 of them women, tried hard today under the handicap of physical exhaustion, to carry on the militant spirit.

Long into the morning the prisoners continued to shout and sing in their crowded quarters at the station while radical leaders of the Textile mills committee urged their companions under arrest to embarrass authorities still further by refusing to apply for or accept bail.

Those under arrest were operatives affiliated with the labor group opposed to the new Bedford Textile council, the recognized union body which has consistently refused to be a part of the demonstrations which have involved police clashes.

As news spread of the wholesale roundup, a crowd estimated at 10,000 gathered about the police station. Chief of Police Samuel D. McLeod then called upon Battery E of the Coast Artillery while deputy sheriffs forced their way into the throng to read the riot act.

The national guardmen surprised the mob by pouring out of the station with fixed bayonets and although a few stones greeted their arrival the crowd was quickly pushed back and the streets cleared for two blocks in all directions. An erroneous report that a man or woman had been stabbed by a soldier's bayonet temporarily caused fresh excitement.

Police found complications in several cases where both parents had been arrested leaving large families of small children to wander in the streets or seek shelter from neighbors. The cases were referred to the children's aid society.
