

JAPAN FLIGHT MAY BE MADE

GRAND FORKS, N. D., Aug. 1. (AP)—A flight across the Pacific to Tokyo, Japan, is again reported under consideration by Lieut. Carl Ben Eielson, North Dakota aviator who is resting at his home at Hatton, near here.

This was indicated today when the flier, who piloted Sir Hubert Wilkins across the Arctic fields, came to Grand Forks with his sister, Helen, for a brief visit.

While Eielson made no public statement it was indicated that the Pacific flight was under consideration by himself and interests in Detroit, and that the outcome of these negotiations would influence his decision with respect to accompanying Wilkins on a South Pole expedition.

MEN ARRESTED FOR ATTACKING JAP WORKERS

HOQUIAM, Wash., August 1. (AP)—Aroused by the attack of Japanese workmen at Capulis crossing Sunday night, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney John C. Graham said today that arrests would be made shortly and that authorities of Grays Harbor county would prosecute all those guilty in what he termed a "well founded conspiracy."

"These people at Capulis crossing picked on innocent workmen," declared Deputy Prosecutor Graham. "We are not interested in the nationality of those evicted for they were merely pawns. If the people who planned and carried out the forcible eviction and who took the law in their own hands illegally had wanted to prevent the Japanese working there, they should have taken orderly steps."

While he refused to name any of the ring leaders in the affair, Graham inferred strongly that some of them were known. He declared the "beating" of E. Watanabe was extremely brutal.

INMATES HAVE MALTA FEVER

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used only pasteurized milk since the disease was discovered in May, but two patients coming to the hospital since that time have reacted to the blood test, though they are not ill. This shows, it is said, that the Malta fever germ is prevalent elsewhere in the state. This is attributed to the fact that contagious abortion is present among cattle in many states. Thirty per cent of the dairy cattle of Tillamook county are said to be infected.

Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane, urged that action be taken by the board to ward off Malta fever, even to the extent of destroying all cattle seriously affected with contagious abortion. He said the insane hospital is using pasteurized milk and urged that all other institutions be required to do so. It developed that all institutions that buy milk from dairies are getting a pasteurized product. Heads of institutions that have their own herds were given authority by the board to do their own pasteurizing.

The death rate is only about 2 per cent. The troublesome feature of the ailment is its long duration, which is from two or three months to two years.

FATHER SAVES DROWNING BOY

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 1. (AP)—Hearing the cries of a drowning child, A. T. Sorenson, Southern Pacific warehouse foreman, leaped from a log boom into Corvallis Bay last night and saved the boy. When he brought the lad to the surface he discovered it was his own nine year old son Vernon. The boy was unconscious.

TRAIN STRIKES CAR, FOUR DIE

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Aug. 1. (AP)—Four persons were reported killed and a fifth seriously injured when a Southern railway passenger train struck an automobile at a grade crossing at China Grove near here today.

The driver of the car was seriously injured and may die.

"Don't be silly," Ceccioni said to her. "If you don't stop crying I will go back to the pole."

A peasant woman who had walked many miles into Florence to see the survivors, approached General Nobile's wife, who had come there to meet him and said: "What a happy woman you are to have such a man."

DEATH OF BOY Baffles Police

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1. (AP)—Two mysteries remained unsolved today in the death of Frank Plummer, Portland youth whose body was found yesterday on the bank of the Columbia river near Eagle creek.

These involved ownership of the rifle with which the boy was shot through the head, and identity of a young man wearing a pink shirt who was with Plummer when he was last seen alive in Portland last Friday.

Inspector Robert Craddock, of Portland police declared after an investigation that Plummer had shot himself to death holding the rifle at arm's length. The sheriff's office and the coroner concurred in the suicide theory, but the boy's parents still contended today that their son had met with foul play. No motive for suicide was learned. The boy had money in the bank, and no worries so far as his family knew. The funeral will be held tomorrow.



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AVIATORS START ON LONG FLIGHT

Ruiz de Alda, who was with Franco on the first flight across the South Atlantic in 1926, was navigator aboard the plane. The other members of the crew were Emilio Gallarza, co-pilot, and Pablo Rada, mechanic.

A picturesque crowd gathered on the beach to see the aviators off. Men, women and children had been assembling since midnight. Some had guitars and by two o'clock this morning many couples were dancing in the moonlight, while the children sang.

Meanwhile the four aviators were aboard the plane, anxiously awaiting the moment of departure. At 6:15 the Numancia's four 500 horsepower motors added their roar to the music which came across the waters from the shore.

A few minutes later the grey seaplane with a Spanish flag painted on its side sped over the waters of the harbor, but was unable to rise. Another futile attempt was made and then the plane was lightened. On the third try the plane rose gracefully from the water, and disappeared toward the Azores.

The plane will be navigated by directional wireless.

Major Franco and Captain Ruiz de Alda, who is one of the crew accompanying him were the first to span the south Atlantic by air accomplishing the feat in 1926.

The seaplane is a 2000 horsepower super-Dornier, of Spanish construction. It has a cruising radius of 4000 kilometers (2485 miles). It has shown an average speed in test of 104 miles an hour.

The plane is equipped with hammocks so that those off duty may rest. The cabin is fitted with navigation devices which Ruiz de Alda said were similar to those in the cabin of the captain of a large liner.

Projected stops on the flight include Horta, Island of Fayal; Azores; Halifax, New York; Havana, Mexico City, La Paz; Bolivia; lower California San Francisco, Port Eslington, B. C.; Unalakleet, Alaska and Petropavlovsk, Siberia. From Siberia, Major Franco will fly to Japan, the Philippine Islands, India, Italy and back to Cadiz.

The purpose of the flight is to prove the possibility of using the seaplane as a successful means of transporting passengers and mail across the ocean.

WORKERS KILLED LOWERING GATE

The crane nearest to the head of the lock held but the boom of the crane at the lower end slipped, the huge gate crashed into the steel gate fabric at the east side of the lock, and, smashing the steel work fell to the bottom of the lock, crushing the workmen.

Those who were killed were so badly crushed that identification was difficult. It was reported that two men on the crane which fell with the gate were killed but their bodies had not been recovered. It is also feared that several bodies would be found beneath the great gate when the twisted steel is raised so as to permit workmen to walk beneath.

COLLEGE GIRLS CARE FOR TOTS

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 1.—One small and widely scattered company of American babies is reversing the domestic "order of things. It is helping to bring up the next generation of mothers.

In more than a score of colleges throughout the country, babies, ranging in age from a few months to two or three years, now are being cared for by girls of the home economics classes who are learning at first-hand the duties they will have to assume as home-makers and mothers, according to an article written for the Farm Journal for August.

Such widely scattered institutions as Cornell university, Minnesota state college, Oregon state college and the University of

which have established model homes in which each girl spends part of her time, preparing the meals, cleaning, sewing, keeping the budget in order and, of course, caring for the baby. Cornell, for example, has two such "practice homes" in which 14 babies have been cared for.
