LAKEVIEW POST OFFICE WILL BE STARTED SOON

Work of constructing the new building for the Lakeview post office will commence this coming week, according to Fred Peat, brother of Dr. L. W. Peat of this city, who arrived here late Thursday afternoon with Mrs. Peat.

A contract was to be awarded today, and the contractor will be instructed to proceed at once. Present plans are to complete the building within 40 days, which will permit the removal of the post office to its new quarters early in September.

Fred Reynolds, brother-in-law of Fred Peat and B. K. Snyder, have the contract to furnish post office facilities for the government.

The new building will be erected on the vacant lot between the Gunther and Ahlstrom harness shop and the Lakeview Electric company.

Brick will be used for the exterior of the building which is to have a full basement and a modern heating plant. It will be 75 by 221 feet in size and will give the post office department greatly enlarged quarters.

Three hundred keyless post office boxes will be installed in order to care for the growth of Lakeview, according to Mr. Peat.

The building and equipment will cost in the neighborhood of \$7000. A ten-year lease has been received by the owners from the post office department.

Mr. and Mrs. Peat and three children are en route to the coast on a two week's vacation trip.

WILL APPOINT HAY INSPECTOR

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 3. (AP)—A federal supervisor of hay inspection for the northwest may be located in Portland as a result of the combined efforts of W. H. D. Dodson, manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, and United States Senator Charles L. McNary.

Upon being informed some time ago that a laboratory for hay inspection was about to be located in Los Angeles, Mr. Dodson telegraphed the chief of the bureau of agricultural economics at Washington, pointing out that Portland, as the center of the hay producing area of the northwest, was the logical place for the inspection. He also conferred with Senator McNary who took up the matter with bureau officials.

A letter to Senator McNary from C. W. Kitchen, acting chief of the bureau, states that the bureau will gladly participate in any way possible in an inspection service jointly with the states of Oregon and Washington, and that should the demand develop to the point where a service can be established in cooperation with the state agencies, the bureau will give careful consideration to location of the supervisor at Portland.

INSURANCE MAN HURT IN CRASH

M. B. Martin of this city sustained a fractured arm, and bruises and cuts in an automobile accident on the Lakeview highway late Wednesday afternoon.

Martin, who is connected with Johnny Houston in the insurance business, was en route to Lakeview on business when a passing motorist crowded his car into the loose gravel. On his side of the road was a 200-foot drop, but with a dexterous turn of the wheel, Martin avoided going over the bank. The car shot across the road and turned completely over and Martin was flung from it. The injured man was rushed to a local hospital, where his condition last night was reported as favorable. Mrs. Martin is day clerk at the Kerns hotel.
