BLACKMER WILL BE RETURNED

PARIS, Aug. 6. (AP)—Formal demand for extradition of Henry M. Blackmer, missing Trappist monk, was made today by the French foreign office considered no action could be taken until documents in the case had arrived and been examined.

These have now reached Paris. They were sent by special messenger and have been transmitted to the foreign office. It was said there that a decision might be reached speedily.

Meanwhile, Blackmer will be kept under a sort of surveillance by authorities who are not disposed to arrest him until a decision is reached.

Blackmer returned to Paris from Trouville today going to his residence, the hotel Plaza Athenee. He had read a newspaper and came to consult friends. He will probably return to Trouville in a day or two.

AMERICAN GIRL BREAKS RECORD

OLYMPIC SWIMMING STADIUM, Amsterdam, Aug. 6. (A.P.)—Martha Norelius of New York was crowned queen of the mermaids of the world today when she captured the Olympic 400 meter free style swimming championship for the second time in two Olympiads.

In defending her title won in 1924 against five of the world's speediest girl swimmers, the American ace shattered the world record established by herself only Saturday, covering the distance in the hitherto incredible time of 5 minutes, 42 4-5 seconds. This was 2 3-5 seconds faster than the mark she set in her first preliminary heat two days ago.

American men swimmers could do no better than third and fourth in their championship event today, the 1500 meter free style as Arne Borg of Sweden won in 19:51 4-5 which also shattered the world and Olympic records. Andrew Charlton of Australia, the 1924 champion, was second, with Clarence Crabbe of Honolulu, third, and Ray Ruddy of New York, fourth.

DEMAND REFUND ON GAS TAXES

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6. (UP)—Refund of money totaling millions of dollars collected since 1926 under the California three cent gasoline tax, was demanded in a suit filed in federal court here Saturday.

The action was brought by 58 California tax payers through W. R. Crawford, attorney of Seattle. Violation of the federal constitution and of state laws was charged. Provisions under which California receives federal appropriations for construction of new roads, provides no toll can be charged on the highways and the gasoline tax is a toll on public roads, Crawford declared.

Gasoline companies have free use of state funds for a period of three months and an additional 45 days under the terms of the present law which does not demand a settlement of tax money collected for that period of time, Crawford said.

Approximately \$90,000 a day is collected by gasoline dealers, it was said.

The present law provides a "right" to gasoline companies from the state since a refund of the three cent tax is made to persons who buy gasoline for other purposes than use in automobiles although dealers are allowed to deduct one cent for evaporation, it was charged.

An order requiring state controller Ray L. Riley to show why an order should not be granted to require the refund and prevent the state from collecting the tax was granted by Circuit Judge Will H. Hunt.

RAILROAD LINE TAPS TIMBER

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 6. (AP)—Construction was under way today on 30 miles of railroad north of Yacolt to tap big holdings of the Columbia River Timber company. The rail work, extending from the Northern Pacific branch at Yacolt, is expected to be completed by Christmas, when crews of more than 300 men will be put to work to log out fifty million feet of timber annually from the Dole district.
