If Hoover Used Profanity

The blue smoke in the Rogue River valley which festoons itself about the hills might have come from Herbert Hoover, instead of from forest fires, if Hoover used profane language.

He surely had sufficient cause to lose his temper and resort to words of a sailor during his recent visit to the home of the steelhead. Imagine a community brushing aside ethics and gentility to the extent of kidnapping a presidential nominee and his party. That might have been overlooked had not Mr. Hoover come to the Rogue to fish, and necessarily the steelhead in the Rogue knows his onions and does not become enamored with noise and excitement. If our reports are correct, noise and excitement was what the Medford people dished out to the Hoover party on the banks of the stream. Then, too, were the ever-present reporters and photographers, the latter wading into the stream to get pictures of Hoover. Imagine a man fishing and a bunch of photographers splashing up and down the stream, scaring every fish away within ten miles.

Surely Mr. Hoover was entitled to use the language that Bill Colvig and the early Indian fighters used on the Rogue. He was entitled to make the air blue with harsh words—as blue as the smoke from the forest fires.

While Medford has ever set herself up as the seat of dignity and polished manners for all Southern Oregon, it must be admitted that her claimed honors are trailing in the waters of the Rogue and that her boasted dignity is hanging its head.

Preserve Highway Beauty

Klamath's Chamber of Commerce has taken up a laudable work in its campaign to preserve the highway beauty of this portion of the state. Probably only by selective logging can this be done, as there are no funds available to purchase large bodies of timber. However, the selective logging program is not bad at all, and where it has been followed the result has been quite satisfactory.

All of the timber owners we know are anxious to leave as much of nature's growth as possible along the roads. They cannot afford to leave miles of merchantable timber intact, to be sure, but when the young trees are left standing there remains enough to still make Klamath county almost a park for the tourist and traveler.

Oregon has a law empowering the highway commission to purchase small tracts along highways for beautification, and no doubt the commission can be prevailed upon to exercise that right in some instances. But where the highway runs for miles and miles through the forest the best that we can hope for is selective logging by the timber owners.

The Evening Herald wishes to commend the chamber for taking up this important work at the right time.

Pushing a Railroad to Completion

The announcement that the Southern Pacific company has let a contract for the first twelve miles of the Modoc Northern to the Utah Construction company means just one thing—that the usual S. P. methods are to be used, and when they once make up their minds to build they push it through quickly.

The Utah Construction company is one of the big institutions of the West. When their steam shovels go upon the ground the roadbed soon stretches forth. Consuming several years to build a railroad is a relic of olden days of pick and shovel. It is done differently now.

We may look for fast work on the Modoc Northern, and before we hardly realize it the new road will be down to Tule lake.

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PROHIBITION IN U. S. BIG JOKE, QUOTES PRIEST

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—America's prohibition is the laughing stock of Europe and a hypocrisy that the law can never enforce, Father C. F. McNamara of London, declared yesterday at the Hotel Marx. The priest of the Diocese of Westminster, London, added that he hoped Al Smith would be elected and that prohibition would be destroyed.

Father McNamara believes that it is the poor man of the United States, who is forced to drink "canned heat," that is suffering from the Volstead Act. The rich man can get all the liquor he wants to drink, he said.

While in the United States he has been interested in observing American customs. He believes that America is much more foreign to England than China or Japan. In a generation, he said, the American language will be so different from that of the mother country that he thinks it will be impossible for the two to understand each other.

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COOLIDGE ADEPT WITH SHOTGUN

CEDAR ISLAND LODGE, Wis., Aug. 4, (UP)—President Coolidge has demonstrated his skill with the shotgun, and has proved that he is nearly as adept with it as with the fishing rod.

Shooting Saturday on the new traps at the lodge the president's score was seven out of nine. His opponent, Colonel E. W. Starling, of the White House secret service staff, made a slightly lower score.

The trapshooting range is a recent addition to Mr. Coolidge's outdoor exercise. It was constructed at his express order after paraphernalia for it was found at the lodge.

Persons attached to the official party recalled today that the sport was Mr. Coolidge's favorite outdoor recreation in his early 20s. Then his marksmanship was mediocre but even so he prided himself on his clay pigeon rating.

Earlier in the day the president fished for trout from a bank on the Brule river near the summer White House. His luck was good and the catch was large.

POLICE ARREST CHILD STEALER

PHOENIX, Arizona, August 6, (U.P.)—A. S. Keese, 50, and Lowery Gunnels 19, are in the county jail charged with child stealing in connection with the disappearance of Muriel Toney, 14, daughter of a Somerton, Arizona, minister.

The men were arrested in an auto camp by deputy sheriffs who said they found the men stretched out under a shade tree while the preacher's daughter frolicked about on a canal bank with two of Keese's children.

Gunnels said the Toney girl is his sweetheart and she refused to be left behind when he left Somerton July 5. The girl's parents, however, say their daughter was forced under threats to leave with the men.



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DIRECTOR CALLS ON PRESIDENT

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 6, (AP)—An intensive study with General H. M.
