

GOLDEN BEARS ATTAIN WORLD ROWING TITLE

English Eight Defeated in
Finals Today by
Fast Team

SLOTEN, Holland, Aug. 10, (AP)—Capped by a sensational three quarters length triumph for California's famous crew over the British Thames rowing club in the eight-oared finals, America scored a smashing victory in the Olympic regatta today. The Californians, completing an unbroken season of success, gave the United States the premier laurels of the day and also sufficient points to beat out Britain, its nearest rival.

The United States was the only nation to take two firsts in the seven finals. Americans also captured two seconds and one third. Paul Costello, figuring in a double sculling championship victory for the third straight Olympiad, paired with his partner, Charley McIlvaine, to defeat Canada by five lengths in the final which preceded the California victory, thus making a grand climax for Uncle Sam.

The Donlon-stroked eight smartly coaxed by Blessing jumped the British in the first half of the race, then withstood a great challenge in the last half of the 2,000 meter course to hold the margin in an exciting battle to the finish.

The victory was a glorious climax to one of the most remarkable rowing campaigns any crew ever waged as it meant completion of California's season without a single defeat although opposed by the greatest aggregations of America and Europe. It left them supreme and unquestioned as the rowing champions of the world in their class and kept the Yankee string of eight oared victories in the Olympics unbroken. The naval academy crew won for Uncle Sam in 1920 at Antwerp and Yale at Paris in 1924 but neither more impressively than California did today.

California's time of 6:03 1-5 for the 2,000 meters was faster than either of the previous American eight-oared standard bearers made in winning their races although not as fast as the 6:02 made by California Wednesday in a semi-final race against the Canadians.

SPOTOTATORS ROAR— CHANGES FIGHT VERDICT

Daley of Waltham, Mass., reached the final round of the bantamweight competition in the Olympic championships today with the aid of the loud voices of the spectators, many of them Americans. The spectators roared so loud when the verdict was given to his rival, Isaac, of South Africa, in the semi-final that the decision was reversed.

P. Schissler Appointed to High Position

CORVALLIS, Ore., Aug. 10, (AP)—Paul J. Schissler, head coach of football and track at Oregon state agricultural college, was appointed today director of intercollegiate athletics. With his appointment announcement was made by the administration that the duties of the head of the department of physical education and director of athletics would be divided in the future.

No successor to W. A. Kearns as professor of physical education has yet been chosen, though a number of men are under consideration. Schissler has had extensive experience as director of athletics, having served as assistant director of the University of Nebraska and director of Lombard college before coming here. He has coached all four major sports.

ough. Contract price is \$141,000 and actual work began about one week ago.

Still another major project in this district is rapidly drawing to completion. It is the grading of eight and one-half miles of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway from Bly through the famous Devil's Garden section to the Fremont national forest boundary. This contract is held by W. C. Elliott; the contract price is approximately \$68,000.

Contractors on two resurfacing projects report steady progress. The resurfacing of the Klamath Falls-Keno 11-mile section of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, will be finished by November 1. The contract is held by the Portland firm of Simonson and Harty; contract price is in the neighborhood of \$51,000.

Resurfacing of 18.7 miles of the Dulles-California highway which includes the improvement of 1.6 miles of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway from the junction towards Oleno, is 25 per cent completed. John Hampshire, Grants Pass contractor, holds the contract but has sublet it to the W. D. Miller Construction company and the J. F. Iretton Construction company. Contract price is reported to be in the neighborhood of \$151,000.

RICKARD FAILS TO SIGN RISKO JACK SHARKEY

Fighters Demand Large
Guarantee From
Promoter

NEW YORK, Aug. 10, (AP)—Tex Rickard's first move to clarify the heavyweight situation, hopelessly muddled by Gene Tunney's retirement, has met with failure.

Tex attempted to put through a match yesterday between Jack Sharkey, the "loquacious Lithuanian" and Johnny Risko, the well known baker of Cleveland. The negotiations fell through with a dull thud when Sharkey, through his board of managers, demanded a \$50,000 guarantee for his end. Rickard, a bit wary since the financial failure of the Tunney-Heeneey match, declined to talk in any financial terms but those having to do with a percentage of the "gate."

Sharkey and Risko then went to talk it over with the good signor, Humbert Fugazy, and it was reported that Sharkey had agreed to meet Risko for the \$50,000 he couldn't get out of Tex. However the catch in this was that Risko and his manager were considering Fugazy's guarantee to them.

As a matter of fact Sharkey was quite emphatic in declaring he would enter no more elimination tournaments. He considers he has the inside track for Tunney's title and fails to see why he should be compelled to compete in any round robin whether staged by Rickard or any other promoter. Jack was quoted as being quite willing to meet the winner of any such tournament—at a price.



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River Closure Move Opposed

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 10, (AP)—Aroused by the action of Oregon sportsmen who have initiated measures to close four Oregon rivers to further water appropriations for irrigation purposes, several Grange organizations in the state are threatening drastic retaliatory measures if the bills pass in November.

Should any or all of the bills pass, say the Grangers, fully legal "no fishing" notices will be posted on the farms of all Grange members. The enforcement of a general prohibition of this character, the Grangers believe, should be very effective, since it is necessary for sportsmen, to reach the best fishing streams, to go upon lands owned by the farmers.

The streams affected by the bills are the Dechutes, Rogue, Umpqua and McKenzie.
